

## Robbers Take Phone Out Of Public Booth

Three robbers, early Friday morning, yanked the pay phone from the wall in the public booth at First and Watson streets, Beaverton and took it with them, firing shots at city police officer Henry Mayfield as he tried to stop them.

The pay booth had been secured to the wall by iron straps, to which heavy bolts had been attached. The thugs apparently pried the entire phone box far enough to enable them to cut the bolt, and then made off with the phone instrument.

Lem Short, manager of the Beaverton branch of the West Coast Telephone company, reports there couldn't have been over a handful of nickels in the coin box part of the instrument, as it had been emptied at 5 p. m. the previous evening.

Although the bandits had covered their sedan license with a cloth, officer Mayfield is said to have a good description of both the car and its occupants. He was unhurt in the volley of gunfire which met his attempts to detain the thieves.

Sweeping revisions in rates, fares, charges, classifications and regulations by the Oregon Motor Stages, affecting points in the Tualatin Valley, will be subject to an Oregon Public Utilities Commission hearing Monday, February 2, 10 a. m., in its offices at 625 N. E. Oregon Street, Portland.

Increase in one-way passenger fares from 5 to 50 per cent and increase of minimum adult one-way fare from 10c to 15c is proposed for the following places in Tualatin Valley:

Between Portland, Tigard and intermediate points, except no increase on fares between Portland and the one hand and West Portland junction, Villa Ridge, East Tigard, Sherwood and Mid-dleton on the other hand.

Between Portland, Beaverton, Aloha, Reedville and intermediate points, except no increase in fares between Portland on the one hand and West Slope, Forest Grove and those points directly intermediate on the other hand.

This increase will be in the Oregon Stages' local passenger tariff No. 56, PUC Ore. 136.

Also on the docket are two additional hearings, one for rate changes between Portland and Oswego, the other to increase the interdivision fares in Oregon Motor Stages' interdivision passenger tariff No. 57, PUC Ore. 137 in accordance with the detailed fare increases in local passenger tariff No. 56, noted above, and increasing the adult one-way minimum fare from 10c to 15c.

Bus passengers, who will be affected by these pending rate changes, have about ten days to organize their forces, in order to be properly represented at the hearing.

The PUC notice states, "Intervenors and interested parties will be given leave to intervene by filing appearances at the hearing and will be entitled to be heard. Thereafter such order or orders will be entered as may be deemed proper."

## Jeweler's Car In Head On Crash; Canyon Road Tue.

Claude J. Shaw, Beaverton jeweler, featured in a three-car incident which included a head-on smash into a Portland bound auto, Tuesday noon, January 20, just below the West Slope Lumber yard.

Mr. Shaw, enroute to Beaverton, was following an unknown car that suddenly stopped at the intersection of Canyon Road and Marianna Drive. To avoid colliding into the rear of the stopped vehicle, Shaw pulled in to the other lane, attempting to swing off into Marianna Drive, according to reports. It was there that a Portland bound auto bearing a California license tangled with him in a head-on collision.

There was apparently no serious injury to either of the two main participants, beyond cuts and bruises. The cause of it all—the stopping motorist—sailed on to parts unknown, after the crash. State police are investigating.

Fifty percent of all money collected remains in the community, while the balance goes to the national foundation, for a backlog of means by which needed research and emergency aid can be maintained.

## Three Car Wreck On Canyon Road Hospitalizes 3

Three cars tangled on Canyon Road, across from Sudell's auction mart, Sunday evening at 6:35, totally wrecking a '37 Chevrolet coupe, smashing in the front of a '37 Chevrolet sedan, clipping a rear fender and tire from a Ford V-8 sedan and sending three of the principals to the hospital with various injuries.

As reported to state police, who arrived about ten minutes after the collision, Arthur Bond, 108 SW 3d, Portland, enroute to Tillamook in the coupe, attempted to pass the Ford, driven by Mrs. M. Pasalich, route 3, box 610, Beaverton. Bond's car collided, head on, with the Chevrolet sedan driven by Louis L. Cleaver, 16, of 2626 NE 32nd, Portland, and side-swiped the rear of the Pasalich sedan.

The impact smashed the radiator, front axle and windshield of Bond's car, while Cleaver's car, according to eyewitnesses, spun around about seven times before it ended up in the field, 75 feet from the point of collision. The entire front end of Cleaver's car was smashed in.

Cleaver, suffering a head injury, was treated at Providence hospital as was one of his passengers, Constance M. Reese, 16, 4213 NE 27th, Portland, whose left leg was injured. Another passenger in the car, Richard A. Garratt, 17, 1425 NE Fremont, was taken to Emanuel hospital, with head and right shoulder bruises.

Passengers in Bond's car, all enroute to a job at Tillamook, were Albert A. Yeager, 3937 SE Raymond, Portland, and "White Hope" Anderson, of Tillamook.

With Mrs. Pasalich were her husband and small son.

## DEMOLAY INSTALLATION

Thirty members of a newly organized chapter of DeMolay, sponsored in Beaverton by the Masonic lodge, will be installed Tuesday evening, 8 p. m., January 27.

By a vote of 297 against 20, with two ballots disqualified because of improper marking, property owners in school district 48, Monday, January 19, overwhelmingly approved the issuance of school bonds in the amount of \$240,900, for the building of a new grade school north of Haskell Center. Construction is expected to start in the early spring, in order to have quarters to care for next fall's enrollment.

According to school board members, more people participated in Monday's election than in any similar vote remembered. Much credit is given to the grade school PTA, for its efforts in publicizing the issue and helping make the people of the district aware of the serious shortcomings in educational facilities.

The sum of \$240,900 was set by the school board as an absolute minimum required to overcome serious conditions of student overcrowding and crowding of class rooms. In spite of high building costs, the board could find no alternative to the building of a new school to meet the population growth, as showed by a recently finished census of the school population between the ages of 4 and 19 years.

School district 48 includes all of Beaverton, part of West Slope and adjacent areas. With facilities for 426 pupils, present enrollment of 556 has made an overload of 131 children.
