Only One Form Needed For New State Game Licenses

Now available at sporting goods stores and hardware establishments, Oregon's new 1948 game licenses are being issued in an entirely new form which requires but one form for both hunting and fishing.

Last legislature authorized issuance of a deer tag separate from the hunting license and the Game Commission thereupon devised a new type of license which is expected to save both time and expense in handling.

Heretofore license agents have been compelled to handle eight different forms of licenses, including resident angling, resident hunting, resident combination juvenile hunting, juvenile angling, non-resident hunting, non-resident angling and vacation angling. Now only one form of license is being provided on which the agent will write in information as to type of license being issued, the amount paid, and name, address and description of purchaser.

The licenses are printed on safety paper and come in manifold form with three carbons. The original license is torn out of the book and given to the purchaser, one carbon is forwarded with remittance to the Game Commission office, one carbon is kept by the agent in his files and one carbon remains locked in the book in such manner that it cannot be disturbed. The book with the locked carbons is used by the auditor in checking out each agent's account.

Deer tags will be issued in a similar form to the general license and will cost residents of the state fifty cents. These tags however will not be on sale until after the first of July by the

license agents. It will be necessary to present the regular hunting license or combination license in order to secure a separate deer tag.

The separate deer tag is being used for one purpose: to secure factual information regarding the annual kill of deer on a statewide scale from which, when supplemented with year-round field data now being secured, the department can base sound management.

Oregon is one of the few states which has refrained from using the separate deer tag in order to secure management data. Heretofore we have secured most kill statistics by statewide field checks. However, with the increasing demand for game resources, it has become evident that a more precise measurement of annual harvest is essential if we are to maintain our deer herds in the face of an unprecedented demand.

In order to do this, it is necessary that all deer hunters cooperate completely and promptly by filling out and mailing their return report cards following their deer hunt. The information requested on these cards will make it possible to determine several pertinent facts regarding the deer kill which is necessary for future regulation.

The Game Commission is endeavoring to manage the deer on a herd-range basis, thus providing an opportunity to maintain a continuous and accurate picture of each deer herd. The year-around field data gathered by the department's field agents plus the information on annual harvest will provide many of the necessary points of knowledge which will permit a sound management program
