BIRD CAFETERIAS

Vets Of War II Urged To File For Term. Leave

World War II veterans who have not yet filed for their terminal leave bonds are urged to take care of this matter now while service personnel "are still available to effect their payment," the Department of Veterans' Affairs advises.

This warning came from the army finance office in Seattle, which pointed out that more than one-third of Oregon—and Washington—veterans still had not filed claims for pay for unused leave time while in service.

"Very few claims under the armed forces leave act are now being submitted," according to finance officials. Congress last July gave veterans another year, until Sept. 1, 1948, to apply for the bonds.

Those who filed prior to Aug. 1, 1947, should check on the status of their claims with the office where the application was mailed, if they have not received payment.

Also, a veteran should file a claim if he is not certain that he has a payment due him, according to the finance office, because "the finance officer will compute his leave and advise him if he has received all the leave he was entitled to."

Application blanks and assistance in completing them can be obtained from county service officers, veterans' organization service officers, or the Department of Veterans' Affairs, State Library Building, Salem, or 416 S. W. 11th Avenue, Portland.

Students Contest On Conservation ---Walton League

Students of the eighth grade, enrolled in Oregon schools for the year 1947-48, are eligible to participate in an essay contest on wildlife and its protection, according to an announcement by the state division of the Izaak Walton League.

Prize allotment is \$100; \$50 for the winner, \$25 second place, \$10 third place and three prizes of \$5 each for the next three best essays.

Official title for the essays is, "Why Conservation of Wildlife Resources Should Be Taught in the Public Schools", a question that has long been debated by educators and outdoorsmen.

Essays must be original, at least 300 words but not more than 500 words in length and drawings or pictures may be used. Writings should emphasize local experience or otherwise bring out local community problems as they relate to the importance in relationship of wildlife resources to other resources of the state.

Closing date on the contest is March 1, 1948 and all entries must be mailed to Paul M. Dunn, dean of the School of Forestry, Oregon State College, Corvallis.

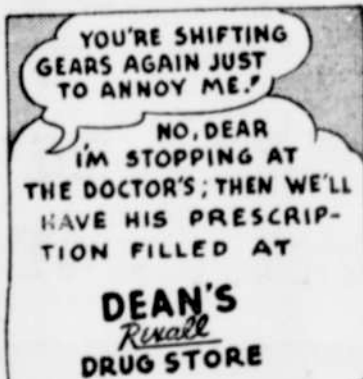

Agent Advises Nitrogen Now ---Growing Gain

Orchardists who have cover crops that are not making satisfactory growth may make an application of between 100 and 200 pounds of ammonium sulphate per acre the latter part of January or early in February, advises Palmer S. Torvend, county agent.

This application of nitrogen will give the crop a boost before time for plowing or working it under. This is particularly true of non-legume crops such as oats and barley or rye. Some growers have reported as much as 300 per cent increase in growth where nitrogen fertilizer has been used over the untreated portions.

Farmers who use commercial fertilizer and obtain heavy growth of cover crop will need to watch soil moisture more carefully than in orchards with only a limited amount of material growing. These growing plants draw excess moisture out of the soil and may soon be competing with the trees for it. The amount of fertilizer to use per acre can be determined by amount of plant material already growing on the ground and its thriftiness.



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
