Nimrod Protest Nixes Ban On Multiple Bladed Lures

GAME COMMISSION BACKS DOWN AFTER TENTATIVE CHANGE IN RULES STIRS STORM

Apparently impressed by the storm of protests stirred in announcement of a change in fishing regulations to prohibit use of multiple attractor-bladed lures and to limit hooks on a line to one set, the Oregon state game commission, meeting January 26, adopted final regulations which state:

"The order proposing to limit attractor blades to one on a line and the number of hooks to one set was not adopted, and the regulation will remain the same as last year."

General trout season will be May 1 to September 30, with the exception that the season for coastal streams will be from May 1 to October 31 above tidewater and from June 15 to October 31, in tidewater. Minimum limit for trout will be eight inches in coastal waters and six inches for the rest of the state.

Fishing for salmon and steelhead over 20 inches will be prohibited on coastal streams and tributaries of the Columbia river below the city limits of St. Helens during March and April. Wilson, Trask and Nehalem rivers will be closed to all salmon fishing from March 1 to September

15, while the Miami river will be closed to all fishing during the month of November.

There will be no open season in the winter for steelhead, in the Willamette river and its tributaries above Oregon City Falls, except the Santiam river and its North and South forks. Bag limit for salmon and steelhead over 20 inches will be 2 a day or 4 in any 7 consecutive days or in possession, but not more than 20 during any one year.

The jack salmon bag limit will be 10 fish a day but not more than 20 in possession at any one time, provided that during the open trout season the bag limit for jack salmon is to be counted as part of the general trout bag.

Last year's closure of certain coastal tributaries will remain in effect this year, instead of being opened for summer trout fishing, as tentatively proposed.

Boat fishing in the Tillamook county streams above the head of tidewater will not be prohibited.

Tributary closures of last year, in Washington county, will remain in effect for 1948.

BEEF POT ROAST

- 4 lbs. beef chuck
- 3 tbsps. lard
- Clove of garlic
- 1 cup water
- (if desired) 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire
- 3 tps. salt
- 1/4 cup chili sauce
