ODAKOS POP CORN

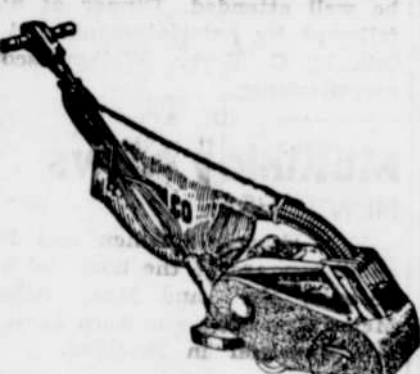
