ANNOYS AN OYSTER

An outstanding characteristic of the oyster is its ability to change its sex from year to year a phenomenon known as "sex reversal." Young oysters in their first year of life are generally male. During the second year half of them will become females and a certain number will continue to alternate between one sex and the other.

Replace Old Hens With Early Chix; Gain On Market

In co-operation with the government's program for grain conservation, farm officials are urging the culling of old flocks and the purchase of early chicks.

"Sell a hen, buy three early chicks" is the theme advanced by T. E. Schommer, president of Triangle Milling company, one of the Northwest's leading feed manufacturers. "The grain each 'non-productive' hen would eat during the next six months could carry three early chicks to laying pullet age," Mr. Schommer states.

He further points out the fact that there is need for further grain conservation until the new crop is at hand, but there is also danger in wholesale flock liquidation with no chick replacements. Liquidation of farm flocks during the month of December was almost double that of 1946. At the same time, per capita demand for eggs in December, despite "eggless Thursday" was the second largest on record for the month.

"The poultryman who culls out his unproductive layers now and replaces them with early chicks will not only conserve grain but will cash in on next fall's promising egg market," Mr. Schommer concludes.
