

Six Hopeful For Commissioner In Wash. County



The hottest political race in the May 21 primary election, Washington county, is that of commissioners to the county court with six hopefuls in the race.

Incumbent James Lewis, whose picture is shown, formally filed for nomination to succeed himself on February 25. Listing Beaverton as his address, Mr. Lewis says he has lived in the area for 40 years, since 1911, with his address shifting between Huber and Aloha. He's a Republican.

His family had started the Beaverton Lumber company and the Beaverton Transfer company, in early days.

From route 3, Beaverton, T. M. Tom Ramsdell, Jr., Republican, has entered the commissioner race. He is co-chairman of the American Legion athletic committee and has been instrumental in fostering sports competitions among youngsters.

Arthur A. Carlson, Aloha garage man who once served as city commissioner in a New England city of about 50,000, will also try for Republican nomination, as will Arthur F. Kroeger, Hillsboro, and Alex Elschen, Cornelius.

C. R. Merrill, Hillsboro, is the lone Democrat among the candidates.

In other county races, four candidates have declared themselves for the office of county sheriff while only the incumbents have entered the primary race for county assessor, county clerk and county superintendent of schools.

J. E. Carpenter, Forest Grove, seeks re-election, Republican, to the assessor's office. W. A. Tupper, Hillsboro, runs for his present office of county clerk, as Republican. Austin T. Scrafford, county superintendent of schools, seeks to return to his office on the non-partisan basis.

Because he has no opposition, Scrafford will not have to run on the primary ballot because his race is non-partisan. He will be included in the November election, however.

Kenneth A. Mills, Republican, route 3, box 726, Beaverton, is the eastern end of the county candidate for sheriff, an endeavor likewise claimed by R. H. Busch, Republican, Hillsboro; G. H. "Hallie" Ireland, Republican, Hillsboro, and T. M. Williams, Democrat, Hillsboro.

He is a practicing lawyer in Washington county and Portland, heads the Standard Insurance and Investment company and has been active in civic and fraternal affairs at Tigard. Since my grandchildren and wife do not require all of my time and energy, I would like to devote the remainder to the state of Oregon and Washington county, in particular."

Erwin was the founder of the Collins and Erwin Piano company, from which he retired during the war, although the firm still carries his name.

Ex-State Solon Enters Race For Representative



Maintaining his long time record of public service, Earl E. Fisher, Beaverton, former state senator, entered his name on the Republican list of nomination seekers for the position of state representative.

Mr. Fisher, Washington county pioneer, has devoted a large share of his lifetime in serving the public. Some of his many positions of trust include school teaching, editor of a Beaverton newspaper, mayor, state representative and senator. He has also given much time to problems of drainage and flood control.

Asked at present time to issue a statement, Mr. Fisher declared, "I will serve the best interests of Washington county, her people and their public welfare." He sends best wishes to all his friends in the Tualatin valley and hopes to serve them at Salem in 1949.
