Reports from the frantic rehearsal sessions say the flagrantly amateur broadcasters are working like crazy on their zany programs. So funny is the program as developed, the actors even laugh at their own jokes.

The key production, a cornfield "mellodrammer" called "Dastardly Deeds", portrays Janice Osfield as Ruthless Rudolph and Mary Jane Taggart as Virtuous Nell. A highlighting feature of the evening will be the cafeteria, being run as a side-line concession. All in the house to eat will be offered, 'tis said.

State Educators 45th Convention Meets April 1, 2, 3

Oregon teachers will gather in Portland Thursday, Friday and Saturday, April 1, 2 and 3 for the 45th annual convention of the Oregon Education association.

Teachers will hear prominent lectures and will also meet in subject-field groups to discuss their mutual teaching problems. Billed for appearances on the program are civic leaders and prominent educational authorities.

More than twenty subject-field departments will meet during the convention, and many of the prominent educational groups and colleges have scheduled luncheons and banquets for the occasion.

Musical talent from San Francisco will appear on the convention program Thursday morning when the Standard School broadcast is originated from the stage of the Portland Civic auditorium. The program will be released through radio station KGW, Portland, to NBC network stations in the eleven western states.

New officers of the association will also be installed at the Saturday morning program. To assume office as president of the Oregon Education association will be Errol Rees, principal of the elementary school at Lake Grove. He will succeed Fred J. Patton, LaGrande school superintendent. Miss Martha Shull, teacher in the Jefferson high school, Portland, will be installed as vice president, and Henry Tetz of Heppner will take his place as a member of the board of trustees.

The Hillsboro Union high school choir and the Estacada Union high school band will provide music for convention goers on Friday and Saturday mornings.

Special Program On Station KEX Marks New Era

The special program broadcast at 6:30 p. m. over Westinghouse radio station KEX, Thursday, April 2, marks the beginning of a new era for the company, according to C. S. Young, manager, who points out that now KEX serves the Northwest with as powerful a station as any in the United States. Power increase from its former 5,000 watts to the new 50,000 watts gives the station the maximum power authorized for commercial standard band broadcasting.

Governor John H. Hall, on the Thursday broadcast, was asked to push the button which activates the 50,000 watt transmitter. This new equipment extends KEX coverage throughout the most populated sections of Oregon and Washington as well as parts of Canada, California and Nevada.

Wherever the impulses from KEX formerly reached, better reception may now be expected with great improvement through the added power. Most noticeable difference will be the reduction of the "noise level" on many sets.

The first and only 50,000 watt station in Oregon, KEX broadcasts on 1190 kilocycles and is the Portland outlet of the American Broadcasting network.
