

Nat'l Safeguard Single Purpose Says Army Head

"This army has a single purpose—to provide for the safe-keeping of our nation," declares General Omar Nelson Bradley, chief of staff of the U. S. army as he calls on the American people for "constant awareness and generous support."

General Bradley's statement was issued in connection with the celebration of Army Day on April 6, the twentieth such observance.

Admiral Louis Denfeld, chief of naval operations, sending his Army Day greetings to General Bradley, salutes the team play which won the recent war and which is still in force to insure the peace.

"During the recent world conflict," Admiral Denfeld's letter states, "Our military services, supported by industry at home, united their efforts to form an invincible team. Army Day is a fitting and appropriate occasion to remind the nation that through the closely co-ordinated efforts of its great military services, this team must remain strong. For in strength we demonstrate that our great and progressive society can continue to produce efficiently without danger of losing those fundamental liberties upon which our nation is founded."

Secretary of Defense James Forrestal characterizes the army as "an instrument of peace no less than of war," in his statement.

"In both peace and war, the security of our country is the mutual responsibility of soldier and civilian alike. Both are citizens, both are animated by the same high purposes of peace among men, both products of the same American system of responsible freedoms. The army must be prepared for war, and must fight if necessary; but like all Americans, it prefers to build for a future in which we hope wars will disappear."

Red Cross Drive Continues Until Co. Quota Met

Because only 35 per cent of Washington county's \$28,750 Red Cross quota has been reported to date, Rev. Clifford N. Trout, newly appointed chairman of the Red Cross chapter, has announced the indefinite continuation of the 1948 drive which was to have ended March 31.

Incomplete figures list a county wide total of \$10,240.17 received so far. Washington county is thus pictured as far below most of the other Oregon counties while the state, as a whole, lags behind Washington, California, Arizona and Nevada in percentage of quota filled.

Reported totals show the following collections: Hillsboro, \$2,998.21; Forest Grove, \$2,353.60; Tigard, \$1,224.41; Beaverton, \$521.25; West Slope, \$1,558.40; Aloha, \$377.35; and Sherwood, \$33.

Marble Cook, co-chairman of Beaverton collections, reports that regardless of county plans, he will be forced to resign his position in the drive at the completion of his agreed upon term of service. He will leave April 1 or soon thereafter for Idaho, where his mother is seriously ill.

Beaverton's response, as early collection figures show, has not been too generous, Cook indicated.

Even the free talent show, directed by Mrs. Walter Pleskac on March 27, failed to give the anticipated boost to fund totals. Only \$46.97 was donated by the small audience.

"We will consider it fortunate," Cook concluded, "if we make 50 per cent of our quota."

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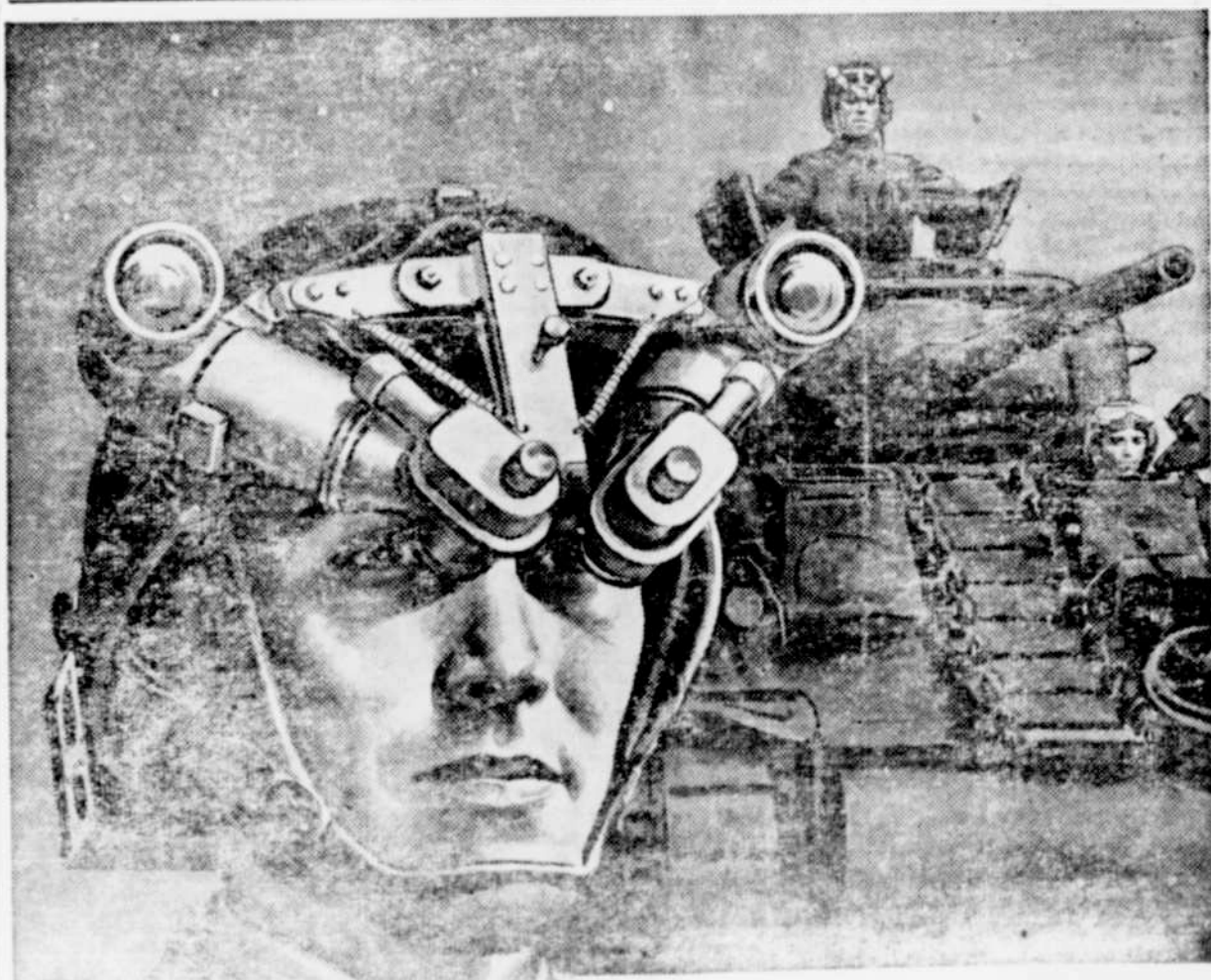
