Attend Classroom Planning Session

The classroom planning conference held at the Oregon College of Education at Monmouth, Ore., on March 16 was attended by Elmer F. Jackman, principal of the McKay school, Ernest Rabe, school board chairman, Mrs. Scott Harney, president of the Parent-Teacher association, and Mrs. Ernest Rabe, secretary of the Parent-Teacher association.

Dr. Darrell B. Harmon of Austin, Texas, was the principal speaker at all the sessions. He has spent the last ten years in research and experimentation in lighting, color and furnishings of the classroom. He has developed a technique which has received recognition throughout our country and is known as the "Harmon Technic."
