Torvend Warns of New Insecticide; Gives Bad Flavor

The insecticide, benzene hexachloride, is not being recommended for general use in Oregon, reports Palmer S. Torvend, county agent.

This insecticide, which appeared to offer considerable promise in the control of wire worm and other insects, is not recommended by the extension entomologist at Oregon State college because it gives an off-flavor to potatoes, carrots and possibly other crops. The bad flavor from benzene hexachloride cannot be detected in the field or at shipping point, but when housewives try to cook potatoes or carrots that have been grown in soil treated with the insecticide the bad flavor comes out. Robert Every, extension entomologist, Oregon State college, says it is better to use ethylene dibromide or DDT which will not affect the taste of the market product.

In trials conducted last year where benzene hexachloride was used to control poultry insects in the poultry house the poultry meat from the birds in the house even gave off bad taste.
