Tom Ramsdell, co-chairman of the American Legion athletic committee, who has encouraged junior league play for some time, says that Beaverton high should field a creditable team. He notes four good chukkers in the lineup and while not predicting a league win for the Beavers nevertheless contends they'll be in there slugging—when the rains let up.

JUNIOR BALL CHANGES

St. Helens, which was at first included in the American Legion ball league in which the eastern part of Washington county will play, has now been transferred to the coast league, with Vernonia taking the spare place.

As lined up now, Vernonia, Forest Grove, Hillsboro, Beaverton and Tigard will compete among themselves.

Total games are held to 12, this year, because of the experience last year, when unusual rains interfered to great disadvantage. Two games apiece, instead of three, is slated this year.

JR. WORLD SERIES

The 21st annual junior world series, under national sponsorship of the American Legion, has been set for Victory Field, Indianapolis, Indiana, September 6 to 10.

In this end of the state, winners of the Washington county loop (which includes Vernonia) will meet the coast league winners in an elimination leading to a district playoff. This elimination picks the state winner which, in turn, enters a regional playoff in Boise, followed by another in Cheyenne, Wyoming.

So will be picked the teams for junior world series play.

SALMON DERBIES

The season for salmon derbies is definitely on. Latest to enter "the swim" is the Oregon City Lions club which runs a competition for three weeks with weekly prizes each week for the heaviest Chinook landed.

A first prize of \$500 and an undetermined assortment of "white

elephants" donated by Oregon City merchants will be awarded May 3 and a parade through town, with the prize-winning fish safely encased in a block of ice sharing honors with the prize winner, will wind up the competition.

All fish entered must have been taken from the river between Wisdom moorage, Milwaukie, and the Willamette river falls, or from the Clackamas river. A witness must be present to verify the catch at the weighing in station.

RECREATION STUDY

It wouldn't be much news for this end of the county, except as an indication of the general trend of people's thoughts and activities.

At any rate, the city of Hillsboro has received and officially accepted a report from its recreation commission and will stage a special meeting of the city council April 19 for due discussion and public hearing of all citizens interested.

Hillsboro, awaiting its report since the time the commission was appointed, November 7, 1947, is urged to institute a year-around supervised recreation program for persons of all ages, with the entire program financed through taxation. Recommended is a full-time supervisor, a schedule of city parks, an indoor swimming pool, children's play areas and other items.

The value of supervised recreation is spreading in its acceptance throughout the nation. Yet, there are communities which steadfastly do nothing to achieve such a program, beyond wishful thinking that some benevolent magic might suddenly make it possible.

WILL BEAVERTON FORGET?

There are many ways for a recreational program to get under way. City governments, if they are able, are admirable directors of such a department—except when run on a political basis.

There is also a direct approach to the problem by people themselves concerned with the major need of some recreational facilities for youngsters, teen-age and even adults.

On Canyon road, next to Suddell's auction grounds, there are two acres of land which have been offered in this picture of a rapidly growing community with no facilities for play and recreation. To take advantage of this offer, of course, a little public response is needed.

The location of the proposed play site is advantageous. In time, the East of Beaverton neighborhood will develop into a veritable business center far in excess of its present status. Enough area, too.

is offered to allow for a swimming pool, basketball court, handball courts, auditorium for dancing, theatricals, meetings and whatever else is needed.

People, particularly working people with children growing up in the community, could do something about this. They could come together in a public meeting and lay plans to build such a monument to the young of the community.
