Opponents to city managers were snubbed April 5, when they submitted a petition to the city council asking for a return to the mayor and city council form of government. Though 73 names were signed to it, the petition was not attached to a copy of the charter amendment and so, by legal opinion, was tossed out.

Undaunted, the petition-passers will try again, says the Sentinel, and four business men are busy collecting signatures, in order to have the issue voted on at the May 12 primary.

Meanwhile, the Lane county committee for Democracy organized in Eugene to combat a movement for the establishment of a county manager.

LESS MONEY IN BANK

Oregon City bank deposits have slumped by 10 percent since December 31, 1947, according to the BANNER COURIER. The drop is attributed to heavy state income tax payments. Loans and discounts have increased over \$56,000 in the same period.

ROAD RESCUE

State highway revenues will come to the rescue of about five miles of gravelled streets in Gresham, the OUTLOOK reports, following action by the city council to spend approximately \$1,500 in an oiling program.

Street superintendent pointed out that road maintenance last year, cost \$1,140. Oiling is expected to pare maintenance cost in 1948.

AGAINST COLD FACTS

Because of the cold fact that Sherwood will eventually have to install an adequate sewage disposal plant, water users of the city start this month paying a 30 percent assessment for the start of a sewer fund.

The VALLEY NEWS does not expect this assessment will raise enough money to build a modern sewage disposal plant, when the time comes. But it calls it a move in the right direction.

Governor Vows
Improve Quarters
Stock Exhibitors

Sanitary, comfortable accommodations for livestock exhibitors at the state fair are a promised improvement, according to Governor John B. Hall in a telephone call last week to Earl Stretcher, resident of Scholls road near the Groner school, after Warren Erwin, candidate for representative, had brought the attention of the governor to the present situation.

Mr. Stretcher, he reportedly declared, "all livestock exhibitors ask is a place to put a cot and roll of blankets, with any kind of shower or other accommodation to wash off the dust and sweat. I exhibit hogs and, while I have to be near them, I don't like to sleep with them, too." Mr. Spitzbart, state fair manager, says there is no money to build us the plainest sort of quarters."

The governor is said to have promised that immediate relief will be given the situation this fall, by use of one of the buildings on the state fairgrounds for dormitory purposes. Furthermore, he plans to appeal directly to the state legislature in its next session for permanent remedy—if he is able. The livestock exhibitors, he reportedly states, are entitled to better treatment than they are getting now.

Improved facilities will also be available for 4-H club members who are fair exhibitors.

Feast said that the society already had more requests for special operations and equipment, such as braces and wheel chairs, than it can finance with funds on hand.

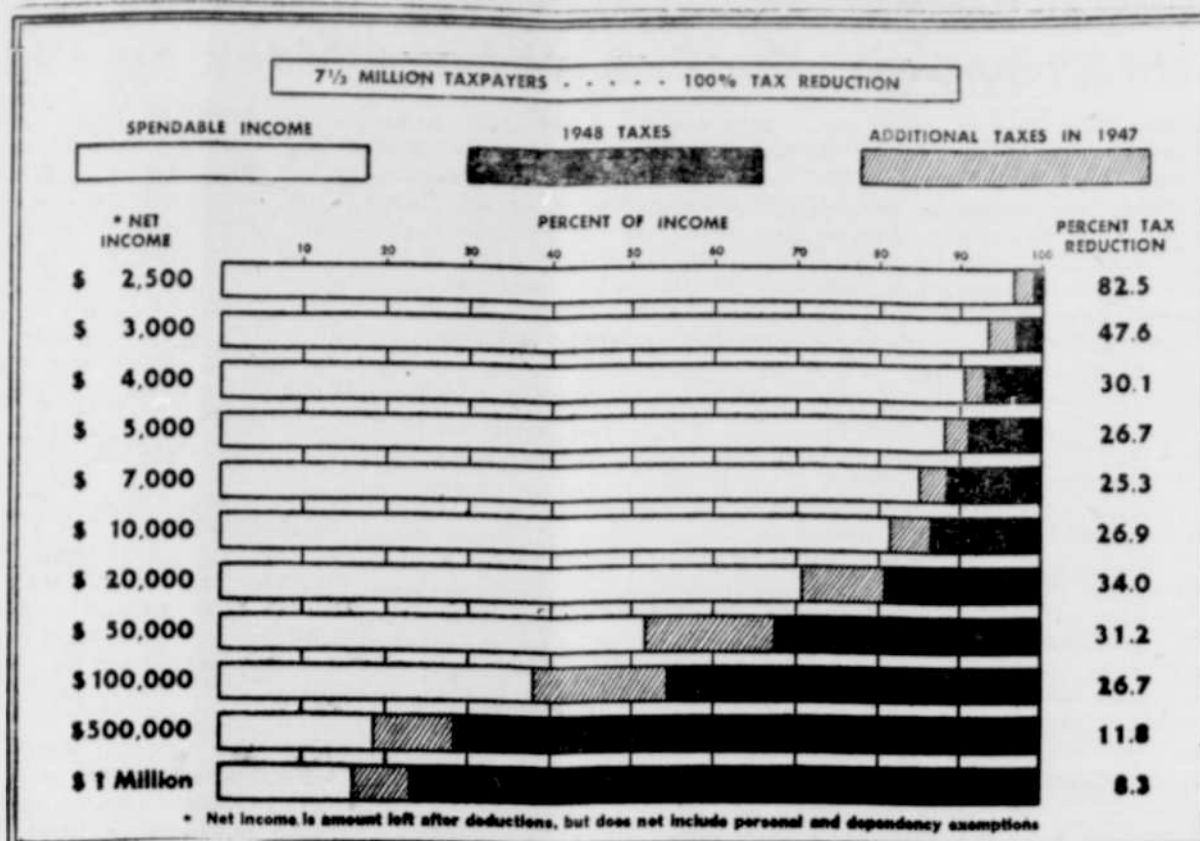
HUSKY SALMON
