

Spanish-Am. Vet Dies At Age 68

Maney Bernard, 68, Spanish-American war veteran, passed away in a Portland hospital Apr. 15 and was buried in the Spanish-American war veteran's plot at Riverview cemetery, following services at the Pearson funeral chapel. Mr. Bernard, retired Portland police department officer, resided at 6612 S. W. Canyon Lane.

Born in Hawkins county, Tennessee, January 23, 1880, he came to Oregon in 1911 and to Portland in 1918.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Sherwood Mark, Van Nuys, Calif., and Mrs. Thelma Laws, Montana; three sons, John G., Missoula, Montana, Charles B., Fresno, Calif., and David B., Los Angeles; three sisters, Mrs. Etta Daggett, Beaver, Mrs. Stella Lyons, Riverton, Ill., and Mrs. Belle Adams, Edinburg, Ill., and two brothers, Lacy B., Olan, Mo., and Denzel B., Portland.
