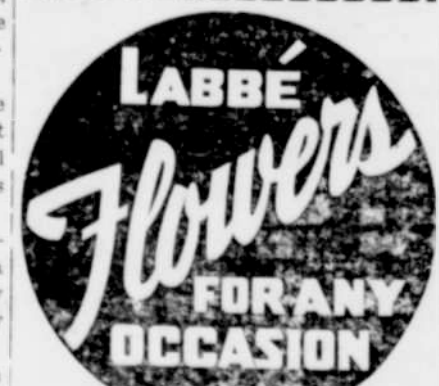
The public is invited to attend the two guest appearances of Reverend Mugford.
