Reader Protests Editorial Urging GOP Registration

ARGUMENT SAYS GOV'T. NEEDS OTHER PARTY FOR HONEST OPPOSITION TO INCUMBENTS

Dear Editor:

Being a general admirer of your editorials, I was amazed and chagrined to see your recent series encouraging your readers to register in the Republican party, in order to "retain their franchise."

History has shown one of the greatest defenders of the principles of good government to be the force of the press. You do not uphold that belief by pleading with your readers to violate the basic principle of government, as you are doing when you encourage them to "join the one party movement" in the state of Oregon.

The first step towards corruption of any government is to form all its peoples into a single party. Sopping your conscience with the rationalization that "there are differences within the one party" is neither conclusive nor sufficient. So were there "differences within" the Nazi party of Germany, the Fascist party of Italy, and the Black Dragon Society of Japan. So are there "differences within" the single party system of Russia, of Hungary, of Yugoslavia, etc., today.

It is not only differences within that we need. We need the honest opposition from WITHOUT, in order that the people may realize the basic facts of any opposition's administration. This is as true in the South, with the Democratic party, as it is in Oregon with the Republican party; there is very little difference! Kill the opposition and you get neither the arguments nor the reasoning. That is your objective, whether you realize it or not, when you argue for a single party state.

Because I believe this argument to be severely important, I would ask for an opportunity to more extensively reply to your editorials, or even better, perhaps we

could meet before one of the community groups in a friendly debate.

We believe every citizen should exercise his right to vote in every election. Yet, without candidates on the ballot, there is no incentive for a citizen to do so.

Our plea for Democrats to change their registration to Republican is based on the fact that worthwhile candidates for whom many Democrats might vote in the November election might well be eliminated in May and less worthwhile-seeming candidates eventually win through to general election.
