

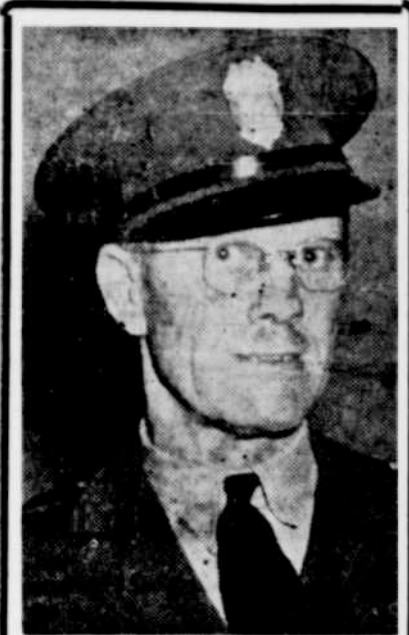

Bible School To Meet In Sections May 27 - June 11

The Union Vacation Bible school conducted by the Beaverton churches will meet this year in two sections because there is no church large enough to properly house the expected enrollment.

Rev. Everett L. Bowers will be the general superintendent. Associated with him as superintendents of the two sections of the school will be Mrs. Paul Knepp and Mrs. Bertha McKeel, with Mrs. M. M. Romig and Rev. Leonard Johnson serving with them as assistant superintendents.

These five people compose the executive council.

The same courses of studies will be used in the two sections, which, between them will use the buildings of the Congregational, Methodist, Nazarene and Christian churches, which, with the Canyon Road Baptist church, are conducting the school.

A central meeting place for registration will be named, and the two sections of the Bible school will meet jointly for photographs and the picnic and for the closing exercises. An effort is being made to secure the use of the grade school for the closing exercises.

The dates set for the vacation Bible school are Thursday, May 27 to Friday, June 11, two weeks, except Saturdays and Sundays, with the omission of Memorial Day and the Rose Parade. The pastors of the co-operating churches are participating in the school and a corps of about 35 workers is being recruited.

This is a community wide enterprise and all children of Sunday school age will be welcomed, whether they are enrolled in some Sunday school or not.
