Gas Tax Refunds Reach High Mark By State Figures

Oregon gasoline tax refunds in 1947 totalled \$2,707,794.73, an all-time high, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry has reported. Under the law, the tax must be paid originally by all purchasers, but tax-exempt or non-highway users are repaid the full amount, he explained.

The refunds were 12.59 percent of a gross tax of \$21,511,631.07, Newberry said. They topped those of 1946 by more than \$550,000, while receipts increased nearly \$3,000,000. Sales for the year exceeded 430,000,000 gallons.

Agricultural users claimed refunds of \$1,298,949, nearly half the total. The lumber industry accounted for nearly one-quarter with \$614,909. Cities and counties shared \$148,987, and aviation came in for \$266,539 to greatly increase its share over preceding years.

Marine and commercial users, mail carriers, the federal government, exports, and state institutions divided the balance, Newberry said. Number of claims was 35,719, averaging \$75.82.

Army Recovers A.W.O.L. Soldier Second Occasion

Fire Chief Archie Olson, acting chief of police last week, figured in the recovery, for the U. S. army, of a soldier from Minnesota, who had been A.W.O.L. for a couple weeks. The unnamed doughboy turned himself in at the city hall, asking for arrest and return to his base at Fort Lawton, Washington.

He declared he had re-enlisted in the army after war service because of the promise that he could pick his theatre of duty. But when he had his mind all set on the gentle jungles of the South Pacific, he learned that the army had decided he would fit into the supply of men for Alaska.

The soldier says it's his second vacation from his post. He doesn't know if he'll win in his argument of South Seas vs. Frozen North, but he seems to be trying.

Archie put him "in touch" with the state police who, it was believed, would accommodate the soldier in his request for arrest.

lons. Taxes on this amount have reached \$235,344,714, with refunds of slightly more than \$28,000,000. As of January 31, 1948, a total of \$205,064,907.75 had been transferred to the state highway fund, exclusive beneficiary of the state gasoline levy.

No Need To Pay Back Premiums

Both men and women veterans in the Pacific Northwest are advised by the Veterans Administration to pick up at least part of their lapsed G. I. insurance, even if at this time they cannot afford to keep in force the full amount to which they are entitled.

Veterans may still reinstate as little as \$1,000 of their national service life insurance merely paying two monthly premiums and signing a simple health certificate. For the average veteran, a payment of about \$1.32 will reinstate \$1,000 of insurance with a monthly cost thereafter of 66 cents.

"Many veterans have the mistaken idea that they must repay all back premiums from the day their insurance lapsed and also reinstate the full amount of the original policy," the VA said.

Actually, veterans may reinstate any amount they wish, starting at \$1,000 and ranging up to the maximum of \$10,000 in multiples of \$500. Amount of coverage may be increased whenever the veteran feels able to carry the added cost.

Veterans who carried no G. I. insurance while in uniform may still take it out, either in the temporary term plan or a combination of term and any of the six permanent plans now available.

Information or assistance with reinstating lapsed G. I. insurance may be obtained at any VA office, service office of a veterans organization, the Red Cross or other agencies serving veterans.
