The next meeting will be in the first part of June, after schools let out.

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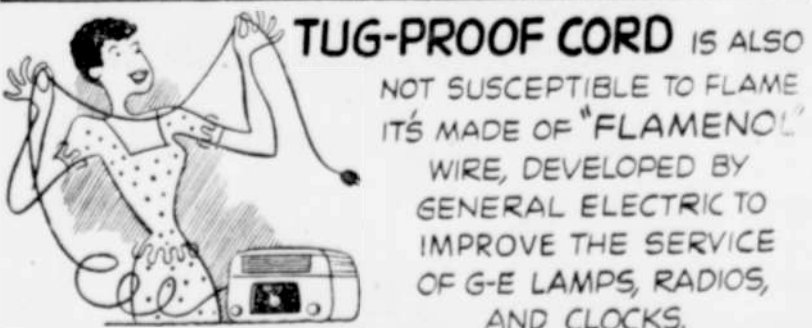


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LEGAL NOTICE

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE A PORTION OF WASHINGTON STREET

Notice is hereby given that the City of Beaverton, Washington County, Oregon did on May 3rd 1948, adopt a resolution declaring its intentions to improve a portion of Washington Street, the center line of which is described as follows:

Commencing where the center line of Washington Street intersects the South line of Farmington Road; thence southerly to a point where the center line of Washington Street intersects the North line of First Street

by grading the same to the proper grade, constructing curbs twenty-one feet on each side of the said center line, applying gravel 8" loose measure, providing for drainage, constructing a macadam surface thereon, and doing such other work as shall constitute a good, workmanlike improvement, and assessing the cost of said improvement against the abutting properties as provided by the Charter and the Ordinances of the City of Beaverton.

It is further resolved that written objections or remonstrances to the said street improvement may be filed at any time on or before 8:00 P. M. on June 7, 1948 at the City Hall in Beaverton, Oregon.

Notice is hereby given that the City of Beaverton, Washington County, Oregon did on May 3rd, 1948, adopt a resolution declaring its intentions to improve a portion of East Street, the center line of which is described as follows:

Commencing where the center line of East Street intersects the north line of Broadway; running northerly to a point where the center line intersects the southern boundary of the Tualatin Valley Highway.

By installing curbs eighteen feet on the west side of center line and twenty feet on the east side of center line; constructing the necessary drainage to the said street, and doing such other work as will make a good, workmanlike improvement as herein set forth, and to assess the cost of said improvement against the abutting properties as provided by the Charter and the Ordinance of the City of Beaverton.

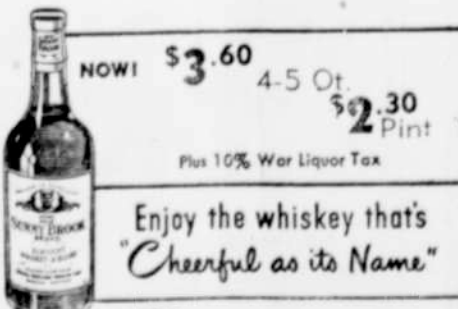
