Rabbit Chasers Live In Luxury Cooper Mountain

Adequate housing facilities and necessary space is now being supplied by Elmer Stipe and Speedy Classen, Beaverton, to people in the greyhound racing profession. The Stipe-Classen property consists of half the old John Huber estate on Hart road near Cooper Mountain. A large house and two small cottages house the owners and a barn will temporarily care for the prize greyhounds. Official racing starts June 21 at Multnomah stadium in Portland.

The first group of blueblood greys to arrive on the scene are those of the "Stephenson Kennel" proudly owned by Mr. and Mrs. Kyle Stephenson, Florida. Their kennel is comprised of 20 well built, full grown hounds. No favorite dogs can be named until their "schooling", in progress now, is over. Schooling consists of getting the sleek animals accustomed to a new track. The owners use the Multnomah stadium for such important activities.

The Stephensons arrived here May 2 from Hiawah, Florida and will return some time in September when the season is over here and just beginning in Florida.

Mrs. Stephenson, a comely lass of Finnish descent, states that the hounds consume 20 pounds of fresh meat a day. That's one pound per dog per day mixed with cereals to produce a tasty, healthful meal without making the animals overweight. Proper weight is essential for a good racer.

Other kennels about to join Stephensons later this month are: "Austins Kennel," "Dr. Stimmel Kennel," "Otto Wohlauf Kennel," "McCarthy Pueblo Kennel," "Mrs. Lillie Kennel," "James Guthrie Kennel" from California, and two "Bingham" kennels. Nine kennels in all with a total of 180 grey rabbit chasers.
