Commencing where the center line of Washington Street intersects the South line of Farmington Road; thence southerly to a point where the center line of Washington Street intersects the North line of First Street

by grading the same to the proper grade, constructing curbs twenty-one feet on each side of the said center line, applying gravel 8" loose measure, providing for drainage, constructing a macadam surface thereon, and doing such other work as shall constitute a good, workmanlike improvement, and assessing the cost of said improvement against the abutting properties as provided by the Charter and the Ordinances of the City of Beaverton.

The locals collected 10 safeties off two Hillbingers, and committed two errors. The Spartans could drive out but four singles in losing their fourth contest, but remained in second spot.

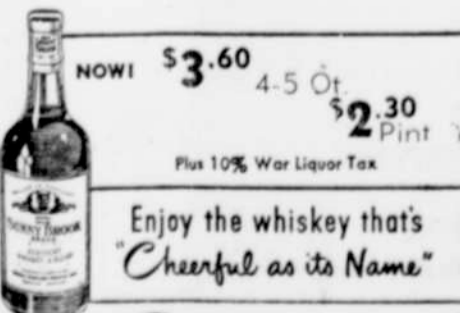

Poppy Day Will Honor Disabled Vets May 28-29

Honoring disabled American veterans of two world wars and seeking to bolster funds for projects of relief and mercy, the American Legion auxiliary will stage a two-day poppy sale, May 28 and 29, throughout the Tualatin valley, in conjunction with the state-wide and national drive.

The Beaverton unit will be in charge of the campaign in Beaverton, Aloha, Reedville, Cedar Mill and West Slope while Tigard, Metzger and Multnomah post auxiliaries will encompass the areas adjacent to their communities.

Mrs. Wally Ehler, poppy chairman of the Beaverton unit, queried on the sale, reports an enthusiastic response from her call for Poppy day volunteers. A growing percentage of these workers, who serve without pay or other reward, will be young wives of World War II veterans, recently come into the organization.

By their side, Mrs. Ehler says, will be older women members of World War I veteran families as well as daughters and young sisters of all veterans.

All memorial poppies have been made by veterans in a major rehabilitation project. All funds collected will go to further the national and local work of helping the disabled veterans and needy children of veterans.

"I hope everyone," Mrs. Ehler declared, "will greet the women and girls who carry out the street poppy sales in the same spirit as they show in helping to make the two days truly ones of remembrance for the war dead and of aid for the war's living victims."
