

City May Go On Daylight Saving Time

PORTLAND'S ACTION FORCES BEAVERTON TO CONSIDER ISSUE

With Portland, at presstime, reportedly on daylight saving time, Beaverton will be forced to consider the possibility of conforming to the time change, according to Mayor Paul Knepp. The Portland clocks are due for a change on June 1 and Beaverton city council may meet before that time to study its application.

Oregon Motor Stages, according to Howard A. Davis, general superintendent, is not prepared at this time to state definitely when nor if it will enforce a change in schedule because of the Portland action.

"We will probably stay on our regular schedules," Mr. Davis stated. "Until other cities which we serve take similar action. Until the matter is somewhat more settled, we can not make changes to fit a condition which might not be widespread."

The Portland city council has only the legal power to affect city establishments and employees. However, with both California and Washington cities turning to the new time setup, it is believed probable that retail establishments of Portland, also, will conform to daylight saving time.

"Personally," declared Mayor Knepp, "I favor daylight saving time on a statewide basis. Being so close to Portland, the time change practically forces Beaverton to go along with the same idea."

According to unofficial returns from the May 21 primary, as listed in the office of county clerk W. A. Tupper, Hillsboro, Washington county voters seemed to follow the general pattern throughout the state. Only in the close race for state treasurer, which Belton seems to be leading at present time, did the trend reverse with a heavy advantage for Sigfrid Benson Under, currently posted in the second place, unofficially, at the election end.

Many local programs and concerts have been recorded for a later playback, one of the most interesting of recent ones being the Reedville amateur youth program, May 22.

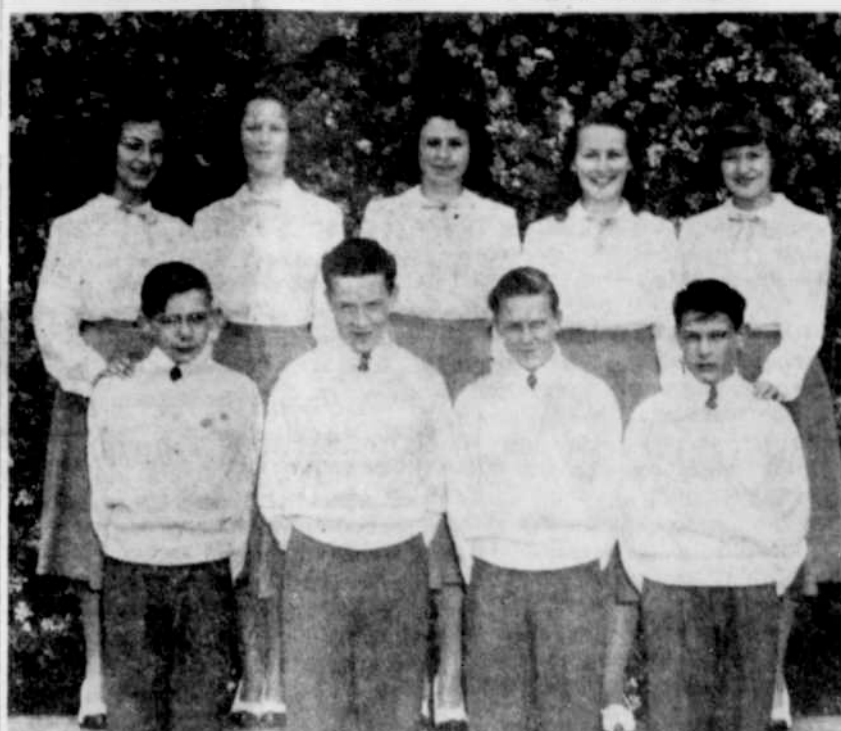

Zooming School Costs Up Yearly Budget Of Dist. 48

NEW GRADES BUILDING CONSTRUCTION AND GREATER TEACHER NEEDS SHOW IN REPORT

Proposed budget for the fiscal year beginning next July 1, for district 48, shows the definite influence of zooming costs, as likewise noted all through the state of Oregon. A notice of the meeting, June 21, at Beaverton grade school, for the purpose of discussing the budget, is printed elsewhere in this newspaper, along with a detailed report of estimated receipts, expenditures and proposed tax levies.

On the basis of last year's property valuation in the school district, school tax amounted to 23.8 mills. Although no property valuation has been set for this year, an increase of at least \$300,000 is anticipated.

With a bond issue of \$240,900 approved for a new grade school, to be constructed near Haskell Center, an additional \$56,859.35 raises the estimated receipts to \$297,759.35. Total estimated expenditures are set at \$150,300.

Provision is made in the budget for the hiring of additional teachers to staff the new school, when completed, bringing the teaching allowance to \$74,950, as against last year's \$63,460.

Capital outlays increase from \$6,050, last year, to \$17,300, next year.

For the total estimated expenditures of \$415,157, estimated receipts will furnish \$297,759.35, leaving \$117,397.65 necessary to be raised by taxation. With an estimated cushion of \$4,000 for taxes that will not be collected
