

Body Returns To Omaha, Nebr. For Burial Services

The body of Thad Irwin, 79, who died May 12, was shipped to Omaha, Nebraska, for services and interment. Mr. Irwin will be remembered by many in Beaverton, having made his home here with his daughter and son-in-law, Alice and Glen Putnam, during the last six years. He passed away in Portland.

Mr. Irwin was for thirty or more years employed as an accountant and statistician for Swift & Co., at South Omaha, Nebr. He was born in Nevada, Iowa, in 1869 and spent his boyhood in the sandhills of North Nebraska at the source of the Elkhorn river, near Stuart, Nebr., where his mother was one of the pioneer settlers, in 1882.

Mr. Irwin was a member of the Nebraska lodge No. 1, A. F. & A. M. and the Nebraska consistory of Scottish Rite. In addition to his daughter, he is survived by his brother, Ben Irwin, 3250 S. W. Upper Drive, Portland and the following grandchildren: Ralph I. Brown, Netarts, Oregon, and Mrs. Lois Mae Floesler, Portland. He also leaves two nephews and one niece. Mr. and Mrs. Putnam accompanied the body to its last resting place.

Harold Gunness, manager of the local movie emporium, reports that he has been advised by the tax collection powers that he must raise his Saturday matinee prices until they come within the taxable bracket for admissions.

For the sake of the 2 cents which each youngster will now have to contribute in taxes for the financing of the Marshall Plan and Aid to China, the theatre ticket office is under orders to raise the price on the kiddies' show in order to keep Uncle Sam's revenue collectors happy, getting their 20%.

March Of Dimes Fellowship For Graduate Study

Dr. Robert B. Livingston of route 5, box 82, Portland, Oregon, has been awarded a \$3,500 fellowship for graduate study in clinical neurology at the University of Geneva, Switzerland. It was announced today by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The award—covering a year's study—was one of 21 granted by the National Research Council with \$83,875 in March of Dimes funds provided by the national foundation under a co-operative training program.

Dr. Livingston is 29. He was graduated from Stanford university with a B. A. in 1940 and with a medical degree in 1943. He served in the navy during the war and was awarded the Bronze Star citation for combat action on Okinawa.

At present, Dr. Livingston is dividing his time between instructional duties at the Yale University School of Medicine and research at the Harvard Medical School. He begins his work at Geneva on September 1.

Fellowship awards of this kind are part of the national foundation's program of professional training aimed at providing skilled personnel to carry on the fight against poliomyelitis and allied diseases.

Canada's under-secretary of state for external affairs, Lester B. Pearson, and Justin Miller, president of the National Association of Broadcasters, will speak June 8.

Roe Fulkerson, editorialist for the Kiwanis magazine, and Wayne Guthrie, newspaper man who is called an authority on the atomic bomb, will be featured, along with Cecil DeMille, movie mogul.

Some 50,000 boys and girls resident in Los Angeles county will be invited to the convention's main feature entertainment at the Los Angeles Memorial coliseum, June 9, as guests of the organization.

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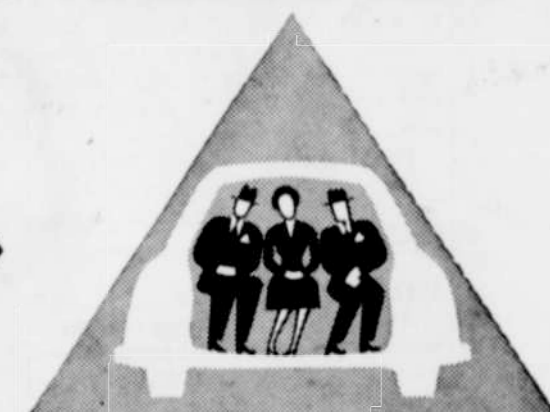
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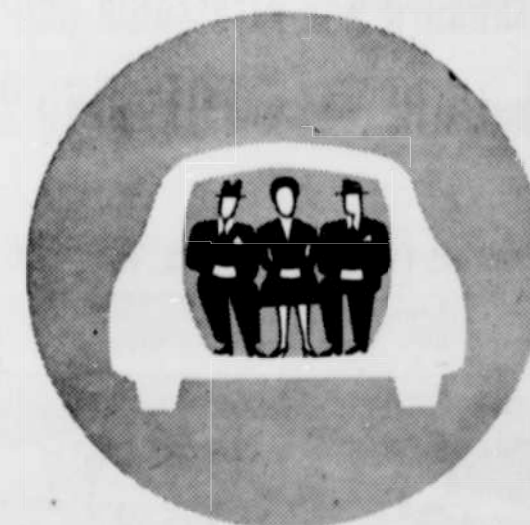
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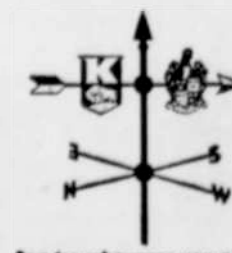


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
