Mrs. Blanton will visit relatives in California before returning to her home in Florida.

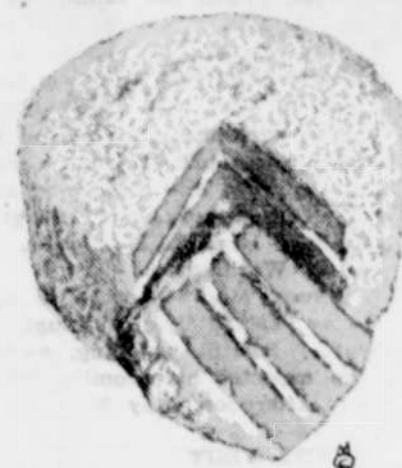
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
