Dog Race Judges Keep Bertillion Identifications

A personal tour through the Otis Wohlauf kennel at the Stipe-Clasen "greyhound hotel" on Hart road on June 2, was the motivating force behind the following story.

John Henry Baty, 18, of Jacksonville, Florida, trainer for the W. kennel, was exercising four good looking hounds, "Cross My Heart", "Rock Bass", "Fashion Fair" and "Imo E." The dogs seemed to be in fair condition in spite of the 3,800 mile trip they had just made from Jacksonville by auto trailer. At the present time, the animals are being rested and within the next week or so Baty will assist with schooling activities at the Multnomah stadium.

The large barn, which can be seen from Hart road is divided into several rooms and in one ground floor room is housed Mr. W's 20 hounds. Each dog is in a separate cage measuring about four feet square. Shredded paper is the only litter used and it makes for a comfortable bed. The pens are cleaned once a week.

Two men, D. E. Baker, official paddock judge at Multnomah stadium and his assistant, Frank Rawls had just finished taking "Bertillions" of 13 dogs. Bertillions are official identification cards showing exactly what each dog looks like. Some of the facts written on each include: color of each toe-nail on all four feet, location of prominent scars and coloring on every inch of the dog. With all this information at hand, the judge can soon spot dogs which do not belong on the race track. Identification of animals by name only does not count with the judges.

Trainer Baty feeds one and a quarter pounds of hamburger to each dog once a day. (The meat is strictly fresh beef for this reason. If the meat is only slightly tainted or spoiled, the dogs would get sick and would be delayed in racing. A greyhound is highly bred, very sensitive and delicate.) The meat is mixed with commercial dog food and three pounds of the mixture is fed to males while the females get only two pounds.

Their heaviest dog is "Western" weighing 78 pounds. In the entire W. kennel, there are eight pups approximately 1 year old. The rest are full grown animals. "Never Blue" owned by the Cecil Austin kennel of Portland, ran the 495 yards in the schooling race in 29.14 seconds June 2 at the stadium. "Never Blue" won the 1946 Inaugural at St. Petersburg, Fla., and the derby in Tauton, Mass., in the same year. He has beaten "Flashy Sir," national champion of '45 and '46. "Beaverton Bud", owned by Bud Holland of Beaverton, is the fastest local hound. His racing time was 28.86 seconds in the futurity race. He was entered in the seventh schooling race at the stadium on June 2.
