

NOTICE OF SCHOOL MEETING

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the legal voters of School District No. 10 Joint, of Washington and Multnomah Counties, State of Oregon, that a SCHOOL MEETING of the said district will be held at the Beaverton High School on the 28th day of June, 1948, from 2:00 p. m. to 7:00 p. m. for the purpose of discussing the budget for the fiscal school year, beginning July 1, 1948, and ending June 30, 1949, hereinafter set forth, and to elect one director for a term of five years. This budget does not exceed the 8% limitation.

Warmer spring days call for lighter foods to tempt winter-jaded appetites and *Salmón Parsley Soufflé* is a simple, satisfying dish. Drain a 16-oz. can salmon (about 2 cups), reserving liquid. Flake fish into 2-qt. casserole. Melt 6 tbsp. margarine in sauce pan; blend in 1/2 cup sifted flour and cook about one minute over low flame. Add 2 cups milk and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Then blend in 1 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper. Combine half this sauce with salmon liquid. Pour over salmon in casserole. Stir remaining sauce into 3 slightly-beaten egg yolks. Fold in the stiffly-beaten egg whites and 1 cup chopped parsley or watercress. Pour over salmon. Bake at low temperature of 325° for 50 mins. Serves 6.

The thermostat of an automatic gas water heater is usually set at 140°. It wastes gas to use hot water at a higher temperature than ordinarily needed. But for the hotter water necessary for such jobs as laundering and household cleaning, a turn of the dial will give you hotter water quickly. Later, to save gas, it can be turned back.

LEGAL NOTICE

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Directors of Union High School District No. 10 Joint by resolution have called an election to be held at the same time and place as the Union High School District annual meeting. Said meeting to be held in the library of the Beaverton Union High School Building between the hours of 2:00 p. m. and 7:00 p. m. on the afternoon of June 28, 1948 in and for said district to transact regular Union High School business and to vote upon the following:

Shall Union High School District Number 10 Joint, Washington and Multnomah Counties, Oregon, under the provisions of Chapter 453, Oregon Laws, 1945, authorize the directors to levy annually, beginning July 1, 1948, for five years, a special district tax levy of \$42,500.00 per year, to provide \$212,500.00 with which to reconstruct and alter the present school building and grounds, to purchase land and equipment, to construct additions to the present building and to provide separate buildings and equip same on property owned or to be acquired by the Union High School District Number 10 Joint, Washington and Multnomah Counties, Oregon, in and for said district. This levy to be outside the limitations imposed by Article II, Section II of the Constitution of the State of Oregon.

The vote shall be by ballot upon which shall be the words "Special Levy" "Yes" and "Special Levy" "No", and the voter shall place a cross (X) between the words "Special Levy" and the word "Yes", or between the word "Special Levy" and the word "No", which ever indicates his choice.

The polls for the reception of the ballots cast for or against the proposition of a special levy will, on said day and date and at the place aforesaid, be opened at the hour of 2 o'clock and remain open until the hour of 7 o'clock p. m. on the same day, at which time the same shall be closed.

The second prize winner is Kim Linnett of 7345 SE 32nd Ave., Portland, Oregon. The other prize winners in order are Billy Gardner of Canyon City, Oregon; Patricia Madden of 507 NE Murrya Avenue, Beaverton; Janet West of Rock Creek school, Olex, Oregon; and Patty Weller, Route 1, Box 70, Tigard, Oregon.

The first prize is fifty dollars, the second twenty-five, the third ten, and the fourth, fifth, and sixth prizes were five dollars each. In addition to the six prize winners mentioned above the Bend chapter offered a first prize of ten dollars and a second prize of five dollars for the essays submitted from Deschutes county. These winners were Bob White and Twila Mae Bliss of Tumalo.

The contest was for 8th grade pupils in the schools of Oregon on the subject of "Why Conservation Should Be Taught in Public Schools." A total of 141 essays were received from 36 schools representing 17 counties.

The prizes will be officially awarded at a meeting of the Portland and State Chapter to be held at the Multnomah hotel, Friday noon, June 11. Gasoline Usage For April Looms 7% Beyond 1948

April sales of gasoline in Oregon totalled 36,427,078 gallons, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry has reported.

Vehicle mileage for the month, based on fuel consumption, is estimated at 436 million miles. This figure, combined with only 20 traffic deaths in April, produced an accident rate of 4.6 fatalities per hundred million miles of travel, lowest in the state's history.

"This means that April, from the standpoint of staying alive in traffic, was the safest month we have yet experienced in Oregon," Newbry declared.

Fuel taxes paid on the April sales were \$1,821,353.89, of which approximately 12 percent is normally refunded to non-highway users. Gallonage figures to date are seven percent over the same period last year, the secretary said.

Approximate tax that would be paid by highway users if a proposed 2 cents per gallon addition were enforced would swell about \$641,116.57—added price for car driving.

Korean Student Visits Vacation Church Session

On Monday, June 6, Miss Walf Young Chung of Seoul, Korea and presently attending Pacific university in Forest Grove paid a visit to Beaverton's Union Vacation church and Bible school.
