ALOHA MEANWHILE INITIATES DRIVE FOR PARK SET UP

At the next meeting of representatives from organizations of the area interested in getting a recreational program underway, a committee of three will report on preliminary outlines for the setting up of a definite organization to handle the details of the program. The meeting is scheduled for June 24, 8 p. m., in Kiwanis hall, Beaverton, and all organizations of the area are urged to take part.

Maurice M. Romig and Tom Graf of Beaverton and T. M. Metcalf, Aloha, comprise the committee.

Another committee, including Mrs. R. R. Sullivan, Bob Eaton and Don Jenkins, was appointed at the June 10 recreational meeting to work out plans for an immediate summer program, co-operating with the play director to be hired by school district 48.

A concerted appeal for funds will be carried back by representatives at the meeting to their organizations. At least \$250 is sought to carry the recreational program along for the balance of the summer. All money contributed is to be paid to school district 48, thus enabling the director they employ to go elsewhere than on school property.

Although not represented at the meeting, the Aloha chamber of commerce indicates definite interest in the idea of a recreational program for the entire area. Along these lines, it is starting a drive for the acquisition of a wooded acreage, necessary for the beginning of a park system.

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Teagarden Co Freezes Pack Flood Victim

FORTY LOCAL JOBS MAY RESULT FROM KALAMA'S BAD LUCK

About 40 local jobs may be open during strawberry season, at the Teagarden Cold Storage Packing plant, Beaverton, as the result of Columbia river floodwaters having isolated the freezing facilities of the Cloverdale Berry Growers Co-operative, of Kalama, Wash., according to Willis V. Huth, local plant manager.

Until the flood waters recede, the season of strawberries ordinarily processed at Kalama will be taken care of at Beaverton. Simultaneously with this extra packing, the Teagarden company is beginning its own full season of work.

Present employment is approximately 40. With the possibility of a night shift for the extra work will be required, a total of from 80 to 100 workers may be called, all of them to be local people.

The only representative at Beaverton of the Kalama concern is manager Ed Tisila who oversees the pack. He reports that the flood waters have not damaged the actual plant at Kalama other than isolating it. Little difficulty is expected in beginning production, once access can be had.

Strawberries for the Cloverdale growers come from berry fields in the vicinity of St. Helens while Teagarden processes berries from adjacent Tualatin valley fields.

Musical Groups Combine To Give Program June 21

The Easter cantata this spring was held in the Congregational church auditorium. A group of selections were presented before the Parent-Teachers association again in May.

A contribution box will be placed at the auditorium for a free will offering. Money received in this offering will be used for the purchase of music for the chorus and orchestra.

Kiwanis Set Out To Further Help Area Youngsters

Formation of a special committee by the Beaverton Kiwanis will implement a project aimed to assist youngsters of the area, at parents' request, declares Mitz Alexander, chairman. The action was taken at the June 9 meeting of the club.

Any need of youngsters, brought to the attention of the committee by parents or others with custody of children, will receive special, personal attention of the Kiwanis group. Such attention might be in the way of recreational trips, entertainment, vocational guidance and help or any similar assistance which might, in the long run, spell the difference between a social misfit and a happy, normal citizen of the future.

"We are not concerned with financial aid to the family, primarily," Mitz explains. "That is a responsibility of the parents or welfare organizations. Rather, we want to be considered as ready to step in and help less-privileged youngsters—boys or girls—adopt a wholesome feeling toward a society which might otherwise seem to be little interested in them."

Any parent who, for example, finds it impossible to give their children the attention and guidance needed, because of daily circumstances beyond control, need only contact Alexander and steps will immediately be taken to fill in the noted lack. Perhaps an afternoon at a ball game, inclusion in a week-end trip or a friendly discussion of the problems of youth will be the course chosen by the committee, after a study of the individual case.

Co-operation of the parent, however, is necessary before the club offers its assistance. Not with an attitude that it knows who should be helped but rather with an open invitation to allow the club to help distracted parents in a problem of grave social consequence for the future is the Kiwanis rule. The group considers appointment of this new committee as an extension of its sincere policy of helping Young America help itself.
