Gladiolus Show Grants Pass To Run Aug. 13-14

The late spring in Southern Oregon has caused a postponement of the 1948 Grants Pass Gladiolus show, it was announced following a special meeting of grower-members of the Grants Pass Gladiolus Society last night.

The show was originally scheduled for July 30 and 31. Because of late plantings and an unexpected shortage of blooms at that time the show dates have now been set for August 13 and 14, according to John A. Bastian, president of the society.

A survey of the 200 odd acres of gladioli indicated that plantings were delayed as much as six weeks because of heavy rains. For this reason growers felt that they would not have enough blooms to supply the increased number of floats which have been entered in the parade as part of the two-day show.

The 1948 show will be the eighth such show held in Grants Pass and from all indications will be the largest. The greatly increased number of grower entries and floral displays have made it necessary to obtain larger quarters and President Bastian states that arrangements have been made to hold the show in the high school auditorium. The show is being sponsored by the Grants Pass Active club and the chamber of commerce.

The Grants Pass show is unique in two respects. First, it is exclusively a commercial growers' show, and second, it features a large number of new seedling varieties. By custom, no admission is charged for the show. A special award is being planned for this year to tie in with the Oregon Centennial celebration being held throughout the state.
