

Words And Pix Tell Story How To Freeze Food

Photographs and a minimum of reading material tell the "how to do it" story in a new single sheet folder on preparing common Oregon fruits and vegetables for freezing. It is ready for distribution through local county agricultural agents' offices or by writing direct to the college. This extension bulletin No. 688, is entitled, "The Freezing Preservation of Fruits and Vegetables."

The authors, Mrs. Lois Sather, assistant in food technology, and E. H. Weigand, head, department of food technology at Oregon State college, have given brief freezing instructions for 21 fruits and 15 vegetables. Included in the folder is a series of 12 photographs which detail the general steps in preparing either fruits or vegetables for the freezing locker.

For easy reference, a table showing a calendar for freezing foods is printed on the cover of the folder. Also discussed are containers, syrup preparation, sugar packing and the use of ascorbic acid to lighten the color of certain fruits.

Iris Gardens Show Eight Acres Of Blooming Beauty

OFFERINGS INCLUDE OVER 800 VARIETIES; BULBS SENT TO MANY FOREIGN COUNTRIES

In a new location of Cooper Mountain, at the corner of Wheeler avenue and Kemmer road, the National Iris Gardens show eight acres of blooming beauty, with over 800 varieties of iris growing in colorful splendor. The company was founded in 1912 by the late Howard Weed and was first located on Canyon road, near the Canyon Road Realty company.

Mrs. Edna Weed, after the death of her husband, took over operation and is assisted by her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. William W. Putney.

Iris are not hard to raise, Mrs. Weed relates. But they require a lot of hard work, care and attention. The job of moving all bulbs to the new Cooper Mountain site, which was accomplished last fall, was in itself a major project which now, seems to have been successfully accomplished.

The gardens are the outgrowth of a nursery but the late Mr. Weed began experimenting with iris, eventually developing over 30 different varieties. The hybrids are distinguished by size and color, being larger and more colorful.

Seedlings, from the hybridization, take two years to bloom, as a rule. Before proved for the mar-

ket, however, they must be watched one or two years to make sure that they do not fade out or lose some of the individual characteristics that would add to its market desirability.

Orders for bulbs come in from all over the United States and many foreign countries. England, Australia, Africa and China are a few of the recent countries in which customers of the gardens reside.

First catalogue was issued in 1917 and this year's annual is the thirty-second.

Deadline Lifted On Mustering Out Pay For Veterans

Armed forces mustering-out pay may still be collected by eligible World War II veterans discharged before Feb. 15, 1944, who have failed to apply for this benefit, the department of veterans' affairs said this week.

Previously, these persons had only until Feb. 3, 1946, to apply, but recently enacted public law 539 extends the deadline to Feb. 3, 1950. This amended section of the mustering out pay act applies only to those discharged before February of 1944, because every eligible serviceman since that time is assumed to have received the benefit at time of discharge.

The man's service must have been after Dec. 7, 1941. The act provides payments of \$300 for overseas service, \$200 for more than 60 days' service not outside the United States or Alaska, and \$100 for active service of less than 60 days.

Those not eligible include persons who received base pay higher than that of army captain or navy lieutenant senior grade; those discharged at their own request to accept war jobs unless they had overseas service; those whose total service was as an army ASTP student or navy V-12 student, or as a student at West Point or Annapolis; and air corps reserve officers who were entitled to lump sum payment under another act.

Written application and a photostatic copy of discharge should be sent, in case of army veterans, to army finance office, 4735 E. Marginal Way, Seattle. Navy veterans should apply to field branch Navy Dept., Bureau of Supplies and Accounts, 13th St. and Euclid Ave., Cleveland, Ohio. Marine corps and coast guard veterans should write their respective personnel departments at Washington 25, D. C.
