Beaverton Sends One of Three to Training Center

Harry Wold, of Beaverton high school, is one of three from Washington county chosen to attend the Junior Red Cross training center to be held from August 17 to August 27 at Wildcat Lake, near Bremerton, Washington, according to announcement from the county office of the organization, Hillsboro.

The program lined up for the outing includes organization and camp functions by student leaders; discussion and demonstration on first aid, water safety, accident prevention, home nursing, nutrition and local, national and international activities; supervision and instruction in swimming; outdoor sports and games and campfire activities.

Students will have an opportunity to complete courses for certification in first aid, water safety and accident prevention. Twelve adult leaders from the area office and chapters will have charge of the center's activities.

Registration of Veterans Boosts OSC Enrollment

Heavy registration of veterans, who use the summer quarter to hasten completion of their college work, helped boost early enrollment at the first summer session at Oregon State College to 1685 before the end of the first week, about 6 percent above last year. Late comers are expected to bring the final session total to 1900, a new summer record.

More than half of those enrolled, 864, are veterans. This also made a one-sided division of 1258 men to 427 women. Engineering has the largest enrollment followed by education which draws hundreds of school teachers for advanced work.

Farm Woodlands Offer Cash Crop By Future Pace

If confidence is half the battle, then a little of it will go a long way with Oregon's farm woodlot owners who have their doubts concerning the profit in tree farming says Charles R. Ross, OSC extension forester, who points out that about one-half of the privately owned woodland in Oregon is in the hands of farmers and other small acreage owners.

While markets for second growth timber which make up the bulk of farm woodlots have been slow to show up in Oregon, the outlook has now reached the state where a businesslike attitude toward second growth timber will begin to pay off.

The forester bases his argument for more attention to woodland management on three facts. They are, first, the shortage of timber is worldwide and there is no relief in sight. The International Timber conference which met last year in Europe concluded there was little prospect of world demand for timber decreasing before 1960, if then.

Second, there is a shortage of sawtimber in the United States. While it is not critical, Ross points to the fact that the annual drain on the saw timber resources are 50 billion board feet. New growth is at the deficit replacement rate of 35 billion board feet a year.

Ross' third point is the fact that old growth timber in the northwest is dropping. Western Oregon privately owned saw timber is decreasing at the rate of 5 percent or more a year.

Consequently, lumber using industries must make the change in time from old growth to second growth lumber. With this change, markets for farmer owned timber will expand and develop, Ross concludes.
