Moshofsky was also presented with a Law Review certificate, in recognition of contributions and editorial work on the Oregon Law Review, student division.

Four Color Map Tells Early Ore. Territory Area

A four-color map of the Old Oregon Territory as it was in 1848 has been prepared and published by the Oregon Territorial Centennial commission for distribution during the centennial year.

The map shows the six historic trails that opened up the West namely the Old Oregon Trail of 1843; the Lewis & Clark trail of 1805-06; Barlow road, 1846; the Applegate Trail, 1846; the Fremont trail, 1843 and the route through Naches Pass, 1853.

The art work on the map was done by Mrs. Colista Dowling, Oregon artist and Walter Meacham, secretary of the Territorial Centennial commission did the research establishing the location, names of towns in existence and provided other data necessary for accurate mapping.

The map shows the area which now includes Montana, Wyoming, Idaho, Washington and Oregon and parts of California, Nevada and Utah. Scores of towns are listed with the dates of their founding or origin and the routes of the several trails are shown with accuracy. According to Secretary Meacham the dates for some of the towns were established with great difficulty, and memorandum will be kept of any information that is prompted by the publication of the map that may supplement or add to the data on the new map.

The maps are being sent to all newspapers of the state, libraries, chambers of commerce, schools, state, county and city officials and all historical societies of the United States. The map was produced by Abbott, Kerns & Bell.
