Written Test in
License Attempt
Stops Applicants

Almost half of the persons applying for their first Oregon driver's license last month muffed the written traffic law test on the first try, Secretary of State Earl T. Newby has reported.

A brief study of the Oregon driver's manual brought success on the second attempt in most cases, Newby said, although the second test asks different questions.

Driver's license division records for May show 2,208 would-be holders of Oregon licenses needed a crack at the law test in examinations issued during the month. State examiners say this is not an unusual percentage of first-try failures.

"Almost always, those who slip up on the law test don't bother to read their driver's manual first," Newby said. "Those who read it carefully have little trouble."

In addition to familiarity with the more important traffic laws, applicants for original licenses are checked for adequate vision, ability to identify traffic signs, presence of essential equipment on their cars, and are given short road tests.

Driver's manuals, issued free of charge to applicants for learner's permits, are pocket-sized illustrated booklets in which traffic regulations and license requirements are listed in simplified form. Most traffic accidents, Newby emphasized, are traceable in cause to drivers or pedestrians "who either did not know, or failed to practice" the simple rules of good driving and safe walking explained by the manual.

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
