OLALLIE MEADOWS—On Skyline Forest Rd. 96 miles from Portland, 35 miles from Detroit, fair road. Elevation 4200 feet. Space for 12 trailers, 3 stoves, 3 tables, 2 toilets, spring and stream water. Supplies 4 miles. Fishing nearby lakes.

Authentic Dope Due on Motoring Over Alaska Hwy

First-hand information on motoring conditions over the Alaska Highway will be obtained by an official AAA travel car, now enroute from Edmonton to Fairbanks.

"Many American tourists are interested in traveling the new Alaska highway, but to date, actual logged information on the route has been lacking," the Association said. "Prospective travelers over the route would like to know exactly what accommodations are available, what service may be obtained for their cars, how long the trip takes, what should be taken along and what road conditions will be encountered."

The Oregon motor club said many inquiries are received from Oregonians interested in making the trip over the Alaska highway. Permits no longer are required for the trip, but motorists are advised to be well equipped before starting the trip. Equipment should include complete camping facilities, food for several days, extra gasoline and oil and the car should be in top operating condition before starting.

Strawberry Care Should Follow On Heels of Harvest

Strawberry growers who follow the practice of topping their plants after harvest should plan this operation immediately following harvest if the topping is going to accomplish the purpose for which it is intended, says Palmer S. Torvend, county agent.

This practice is quite effective in the control of the crown moth if done early in the summer.

Some growers follow the practice of leaving one or two rows at the border of the patch with the tops on to catch the crown moth flying into the field. These rows are then destroyed in the fall.

If topping is delayed injury to the plants may result from the lack of a large leaf area during the period of fruit bud formation. Where irrigation is available, plants should be fertilized soon after topping. This fertilizer will be used by the plants where there is moisture available to aid in the production of fruit spurs for next year.

Topping is also practiced by growers for the purpose of assisting in the control of weeds and runners. If the topping is not done soon after harvest it will generally be more desirable to leave the tops on, Torvend said, and in some cases growers have reported that results have been just about equal on patches that have been topped as compared with those that have not.

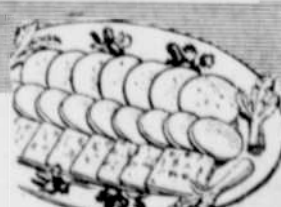
