THE ONE ... THAT PICKS 'EM OFF

GREAT CHAMP TO THE END

Though the years had taken their toll from the world's heavyweight champion Joe Louis, his eleventh round pulverizing of Jersey Joe Walcott, on the evening of June 25, stands as unassailable testimony that he has been a great champ to the end of his reign and as such will remain enshrined in the memory of fight fans through history.

To the CUE BALL, it seems thoroughly fitting that Louis was able to retire, undefeated, after the longest reign in the history of American pugilism. In years no more than by achievement, Louis has established a record without parallel.

Is he the greatest pugilist ever to step into a ring? That is a question which defies ready reply because it takes in an awful lot of territory. But this much can be said with certainty. There was never a cleaner sportsman to dominate heavyweight boxing circles. Nor has there ever been a champion who proved it more strikingly than he.

Destructive Joe was a man of real championship caliber. Any man who could back a claim as contender for his throne was allowed a try, even though such an opportunity proved a one-way ticket to the ranks of also-rans against-the-champ.

Every fight in which he offered his crown found him honestly and aggressively doing his best. Nothing in his record speaks of coasting or of seeking anything but the best available in opponents.

During the war, Louis made a remarkable record, as a fight champion, when he put his title and all that it meant on the block, and got nothing out of it beyond the American satisfaction of having made a real and significant contribution to war time charities.

Surely, such as Joe Louis in every way deserve the rich honor of retiring undefeated after more than eleven years of competition has failed to produce anyone more worthy than he to rule the heavyweight division.

THE SEARCH IS ON

Search for a new heavyweight to occupy the throne which Louis voluntarily abdicates is on.

Featuring prominently in this quest is Gus Lesnevich, light-heavyweight holder who finds himself a little too good for most of the current crop in his division and, of course, Jersey Joe Walcott, who failed to produce the glowing success of which he wrote at great length (via ghost) in a popular national weekly magazine, prior to his disastrous evening of June 25. Lesnevich will be remembered by some Portland fight fans for his appearance here in February, 1946, when he jolted the alleged "Joltin' Joe" Kahut to the canvas with a couple of easily managed blows. Louis, judging his public statements, considered Gus as a much more dangerous and more likely opponent than Walcott — during publicity-buildup which preceded the signing for the recent re-match. And fighters who have faced this aging gladiator would probably repeat the statement that the durable Gus is a mighty good man.

Walcott, by virtue of his successful right that floored Louis in an earlier round of the last week fight, rates even more than as a religious disciple of the Gene Tunney school of bicycle. His style is complex and bewildering, in its latest evidence and of course he should have the right to try as a world champion of all—with the exception of Joe Louis.

OUTDOOR FIGHT SHOW?

Fight fans who were somewhat electrified by the prospect of a Joey Maxim-Gus Lesnevich match might be in the offing for Portland in August or September, are now cooling as the fires of anticipation die down. Matchmaker Tex Salkeld's \$75,000 guarantee to

Lesnevich will probably go down as an example of "too little, too late".

Gus, judging the appearance of Maxim in his 10-round decision over Joe Kahut, would have little trouble of disposing of this alleged "third ranking" heavyweight from among the national crop. Maxim is surely a fancy lad, with a fancy left jab that easily finds its mark without leaving much visible evidence of damage.

But with the prospect of meeting Walcott for a title elimination bid, Lesnevich would hardly be interested in ditching the same for a return to the Portland arena.

Even though a match with Maxim would probably prove to be just another workout for Lesnevich.
