

District 48 Readies Call On New Bldg.

BOARD IN FINAL
CHECK OF PLANS;
CONTRACT AUG. 1

Final consideration of plans for the new Beaverton elementary school building, to be erected on property purchased last year, was begun at a meeting Monday, July 12, of the board of directors, District No. 48. The study should be completed this week and it is hoped that the contract for construction will be let during the first week of August.

Stokes and Allyn, of Portland, have prepared the plans. The structure will be low, one story and of concrete construction with a smooth white stucco. Major part of the building will be built on a concrete slab, poured onto a gravel base.

The only area to be excavated will be the area directly under the auditorium. This space will be used as a cafeteria and as a music room.

Large windows will be used and the low, sweeping lines of the building will present an attractive appearance from the road. The grounds will be levelled off for a large outdoor play space.

Basic bids will call for construction of eleven classroom. Alternate bids will also be asked on seven, and nine classrooms.

The entire design of the classrooms will follow the latest and most modern trends of school construction. The rooms will be large, well ventilated and well lighted. Floors will be finished with asphalt tile in various colors. All ceilings will be covered with acoustical tile. Storage cupboards for materials and supplies, work areas and cloakroom space will be provided for each classroom.

Plans and specifications of the new building are at the Beaverton grade school, for inspection by patrons of the school district.

Favorable action was given on the request by the Sunset Chamber of Commerce, at Banks, for permission to route the big Bun-ion Derby through the city of Beaverton, on August 14 or 15. The walkathon will begin in Portland, August 14, and end at Banks August 15, in time to take part in a large scale barbecue and civic celebration marking the anticipated opening of the Sunset highway. Prizes of \$1750 will be awarded the first three to finish, to be supplemented by whatever prizes might be added by merchants through whose community the weary sloggers pass.

Delegations of citizens were at the meeting, one to request some improvement on the dust-heavy condition of Erickson avenue. Although property owners kicked into a kitty for the improvement of the street, total collections were insufficient to combat the dust nuisance after road improvement.

The city council read a letter from the city planning commission which favorably considered the matter of resurfacing Erickson Avenue and laying a sidewalk along its west side. The city, it promised, will act on the recommendations.

Request was made by a one-man delegation for permission to put in a 50 foot, dead end roadway north of Hazel street and running East and West. The proposed street would open up nine lots which at present have no means of access.

Viewers reports on extension of 12th Street from Watson to Lombard and from 7th to Watson on Hall street were approved and the work so ordered. Lists of damaged property owners plus the benefits their property would enjoy by the improvement were read. Difference between benefits and damages will be considered a lien on property involved and will be assessed for the street work.
