City Budget Vote

chase of 2400 feet of 8 inch pipe, from the Cedar Hills company. Of this amount, 1200 feet is available at once for \$254 per foot and the balance is on order. The pipe will be used to replace the wooden line on Lombard Street and will be paid for from the water department funds.

Investigation of city ordinances showed a license levy of \$20 for the first day and \$10 succeeding days or \$50 per week for itinerant carnivals and circuses. The city manager was instructed to collect \$50 from the travelling carnival which is set for a 6 day stand across from Roy Kendall Motors, Canyon Road, before allowing them to open.

Search of ordinances and past council minutes failed to show any restrictions pertaining to the use of the city playgrounds, at 5th and Tucker streets.

Old water bills from 1946 and '47 regarded as non-collectible were written off, by council action to clear the records of the water department. The request was made by Recorder L. J. Busse and included some credits as well as debits.

City Manager Romig was authorized to proceed at once with construction of a comfort station in the city park.

Because of a misunderstanding at time of offer by the state highway department, the city of Beaverton will be required to buy rock, excavate and prepare Lombard and East Streets for surfacing. Estimated cost of the work, if done by the state highway department, is given at about \$5,000. The city will do the work at an estimated cost of \$1,500 and take the state improvement of \$7,255 for surfacing. Unless the work is begun and contract signed, the city would lose this highway contribution, which is made possible under a schedule of allowances to cities from the state gasoline usage taxes.

Rev. Bowers Will Appear on Panel At OSC Institute

Reverend Everett L. Bowers, Methodist pastor and president of the Beaverton Ministerial association, has been invited to appear on a panel to discuss "Rural Church in Oregon," at the third annual Leadership Institute for town and country churches, to convene at Oregon State college in Corvallis, this week. Bowers has just returned from Camp Magruder, near Twin Rocks, where he served on the faculty of the Christian Adventure Camp. Others serving with Rev. Bowers will be Dr. Gilbert Christian, Executive Secretary of the Oregon Council of Churches; Rev. Lawrence Bixler, Professor of Christian Ethics and Biblical Literature, Northwest Christian College, Eugene, and pastor of the Christian Church at Oak Ridge; the Rev. Mark Chamberlain, Executive Secretary of the Methodist Federation of Social Action and for the past five years pastor of the Methodist Church of Pleasant Home. Also sharing in the discussion will be the Rev. Clark Enz, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Dallas, Oregon.

Among the other fifty leaders who are to appear in one or more of the sessions will be, Rev. Kenneth Daniels, director of the Town and Country Churches for the Oregon Baptist Convention; Mrs. Edna Dagnall, director of the Campfire organization; the Reverend William Bulkley, D., Archdeacon of Utah for the Episcopal Church; Dr. Ross Griffith, President of Northwest Christian College and Dr. A. L. Strand, President of O. S. C.

In addition, Rev. Alcuin Heibel, O. S. B. Minister of the Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Portland; Dr. Correll M. Julian, head of the department of Town and Country Work at Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley, Cal.; Dr. Rex Putnam, State Superintendent of Public Instruction; Dr. Chester Hamblen, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Salem and president of the Oregon Council of Churches, and the Right Reverend Father Frances Leipzig, minister of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Eugene will also appear.

An inter-church project for the good of all, this institute is jointly sponsored by Oregon State College, Oregon Council of Churches, the Catholic Archdiocese of Portland in Oregon, and the Home Missions Council of North America.

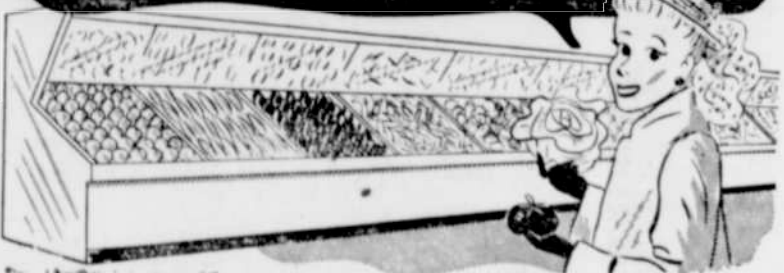

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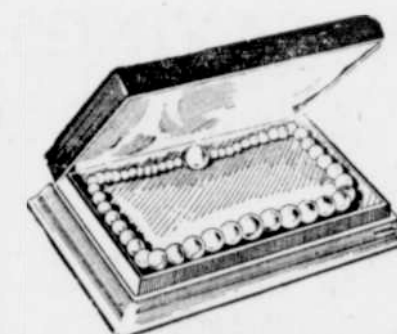
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A CREPE UMBRELLA
