Beaverton Gives Summer "Rec" Program Real Backing

PARTICIPATION BY ALL GROUPS INDICATES
GROWING INTEREST IN BEGINNING EFFORTS

With participation in Beaverton's immediate summer recreational program reaching as high a number as 245 at some sessions, a growing community interest in

the beginning efforts to establish supervised play for the area, according to Mrs. Mildred Miller, play ground director.

In response to appeals for volunteers to help run the summer program, the following adults have contributed time and effort: Mrs. Sexton, Mrs. Fran Alexander, Mrs. Evelyn McGill, Mrs. Billy Jean Paterson, Dick Nelson and Mrs. Taylor.

Teen-agers who have been active in helping guide the recreation setup include Lois Reavis, Bud Ramsdell, Duane Rasmussen, Harry Shaw, Dave Baker, Ken Alexander, Al Byrd, Arnold Stone and Betty Richardson.

Among junior volunteers are Jerry Alexander, Sammy Dexter, Dale Durtel and Alex Kerr.

With an average afternoon and evening attendance of from 150 to 160 showing a continual increase as the program continues, more volunteers are needed to make possible wider supervision and instruction by the two directors, Clayton Henry and Mrs. Miller.

Monday afternoons, from 1:30 p. m. on, Mrs. Miller conducts a class in tap dancing and acrobatics. 80 youngsters have signed up, so far, and one more adult volunteer is sought to act as general supervisor so that more youngsters may be instructed in the activity.

On Thursdays, from 2 to 5 p. m., the first 55 boys and girls who register for it will go to the Couch school, in Por. altdnfq-ETAOINN school in Portland, for a free swimming session.

Every Friday night, a teen-agers' dance is held in the grade school auditorium, as part of the recreational program. Last week, there were about 60 in attendance and the affair was run by the youngsters themselves, with adult chaperones. The dance is held from 7:30 to 11:45 and all teen-agers in the area are welcomed.

The teen-agers also hold their own planning council meeting on Monday evenings, following which is a ballroom dancing class. There are also classes and activities for small fry and adults, details of which are available at the grade school any week-day or night.

"We feel very happy at the response Beaverton has shown," Mrs. Miller comments. "There is a need for volunteer help for the activities scheduled and the activities planned. With this assistance, the program will grow even more."

At the end of the season, by tentative plans, an athletic field day followed by a talent show will be held for the entertainment of the people of the area as well as a demonstration of the benefits from the recreation program idea for the area.

Widening of Canyon Road Said Nearer

STATE HIWAY DEPT.
SAYS DECISION ON
JOB DUE IN AUGUST

Widening of Canyon Road from West Slope to at least 700 feet west of Cedar Street, Beaverton, by the addition of two 12 foot concrete lanes plus 20 feet of macadamized shoulders, is due for action by the state highway commission in their meeting of August 9 and 10, according to highway department men who presented maps to show the improvement and obtain a non-encroachment agreement with the city of Beaverton, at a council meeting July 19. Completed, the road width will be 64 feet. Contract for the improvement will be awarded at the August meeting, it is reported.

Highway crews have finished culvert ditching and other work which is one of the usual preparatory steps to such improvement.

In May, a statement was made by the highway department that advertisement for bids was scheduled for June 1, pending the straightening out of a wrangle over right of way. An unexpected hitch in arrangements, the dispute necessitated a temporary delay, it was reported, in finishing of a job that had long been urged.

Canyon Road, particularly at peak hours, is considered one of the heaviest travelled routes in the state. Narrowing from four to two lanes at the bottom of the West Slope hill, the road has been dubbed a death trap and potential traffic hazard without parallel.

Military Rites Honor Memory Wm. Jas Pulver

Services for Corporal William James Pulver who was killed in action on May 18, 1944 on Wake Island will be held on Friday, 3 P.M., July 23 at the Pegg Chapel, Beaverton. The Beaverton Post No. 124, American Legion will be in charge of services.

Corporal Pulver was born January 6, 1922, at Huber, Oregon. He attended the Aloha-Huber grade school and graduated from the Beaverton grade school. Then he attended the Beaverton high school until called into active duty September of 1940. He had joined the National Guard in 1938. He went over seas in April of 1942 and was a member Bat. A, 218th Field Artillery, 41st Division.

He is survived by Brothers S/ Sgt. Frank C. Pulver now in the Air Corps in Korea; Pfc Voorhus B. Pulver now with the 11th Airborne in Japan, and Mrs. Mary Alice Cook of Portland.

He had service ribbons for American Theatre, Pre Pearl Harbor, SW Pacific-Salamana, Good conduct, and was awarded the Purple Heart posthumously.

Interment will take place in Crescent Grove Cemetery, Beaverton.

Nat'l Farmers' Safety Week Emphasizes Daily Hazards

Directors of District 48 Ask For School Bldg. Bids

CONSTRUCTION WILL BEGIN UPON AWARD
OF CONTRACT SET FOR 8 PM AUGUST 13

Definite call for sealed bids on construction of a new school building, to be put up north of Haskell Center, Beaverton, has been made by the board of direc-

tors of School District 48, after a special meeting held this week in the offices of its architects, Stokes and Allyn, of Portland.

Bids will be received until 8 p.m., August 13 at the Beaverton grade school, after which all will be opened and publicly read aloud and contract awarded. The district's bonds, which were earlier approved by voters of the district, will be offered for sale at the same time.

Actual construction of the building, which has been held up pending satisfactory plans, will be scheduled to begin immediately after letting of the contract.

Plans, specifications and form of contract documents may be obtained at the office of the architects, in Portland, upon a deposit of \$25 per set, refundable upon return of specifications after receipt of bids.

Bidders may not withdraw bids for alteration after the opening and announcement of bids.

With the award of contract definitely in sight, the school district is nearing completion of a project which has occupied its attention for over 8 months. Population pressure has indicated a continuation of an unusual growth of the elementary student body. Crowded conditions at the present Beaverton grade school have presented an alarming picture for the coming school year.

Basic bids will call for eleven classrooms, with alternate bids on seven and nine classrooms. All indications point to the immediate need of at least seven new classrooms, with a mounting need to quickly absorb the proposed eleven classrooms.

According to board members, one of the biggest problems the directors have faced is in stretching the available money as far as possible, to do as much of a necessary job as finances would allow. This determination, heavily weighed upon by the advancing costs of construction, has necessitated complete revision of the original plans.

Occupancy of the new building by grade school students will be made as soon as construction progress permits, it is said.

City Manager Reports

Mr. and Mrs. Victor Wisner are having a survey made of the property they recently purchased just east of Beaverton addition. It fronts on Erickson avenue just north of Hazel avenue. It is to be divided into eight or nine large lots with a fifty-foot street running west from Erickson avenue.

We've found one encouraging thing about this column. Some folks look for it first—"just like the funnies in the Oregonian."

Well, has anybody noticed there aren't so many holes in the streets? We fixed about 137 of them and we've been hearing ever since about the five we missed. In explanation of the missed holes, I will say that we knew where the holes were but we ran out of "hot stuff." Since it comes in seven-ton loads, we'll pick up the few remaining holes later when they are out this way on another job.

The city council has authorized proceedings to start for surfacing Erickson avenue with oiled macadam.

We have the grading done on Washington street and East street and in both locations we opened up old tile sewer lines which emphasizes the need for better sewage disposal.

A piece of information, too, is that the agreement has been signed with the state highway department for assistance they are to give us with the improvement of East street and Lombard street.

The city council has also signed a non-encroachment agreement with the highway department which will clear the way for the four lane Canyon Road highway coming through Beaverton from West Slope. It is expected the contract will be awarded at the August meeting of the commission.

State Boost Helps Speed Street Work

CITY BEGINS ON
IMPROVEMENTS
PRIOR TO PAVING

Added impetus to plans of the city of Beaverton toward improvement of its street system showed this week, on East street, where preparations were underway to prepare the street for surfacing by the state highway department, as a sort of rebate from the apportioned share of state gasoline taxes.

Before the state highway department will surface East street, from Canyon Road to Broadway and Lombard from Farmington Road to 13th street, for which job it writes off an apportionment of \$7,255, the city must excavate dirt, lay drainage tile and fill in with gravel.

For this work, which the city estimates will cost them about \$1500, the state department would charge \$5,000.

On East street, the excavators found that 8 inch tile has plugged up with septic tank overflow and street drainage necessitating replacement.

Last Rites For Pioneer Builder Held on July 17

Last rites were held July 17 for Harry A. Alexander, 135 NW Cedar Street, Beaverton, who had passed away July 15 after an extended illness. In his passing, the community loses a well-remembered builder of homes and a civic booster.

Mr. Alexander was born July 12, 1880, in Fond du Lac, Wisconsin, and came to Beaverton in 1901. One of his first activities was his position as foreman for the late John Henry, earlyday horseradish grower of eastern Washington county, at the time the Oregon Electric railway company was constructing lines through this section.

Later, he engaged in the carpentry trade and built many homes in and around Beaverton. He was elected city councilman and served for eight years, also acting as chairman of the Beaverton water committee.

After Johnson cemetery, early burial ground of the locality, had been desecrated and tombstones removed, Harry Alexander initiated a popular subscription movement to raise funds and purchase the burial grounds that serve as a permanent resting place for over forty early-day pioneers.

He is survived by a son, Harold Alexander, of Portland; two brothers, Guy S., of Beaverton, and Glenn R. of Portland and by Jerald T. and Barbara Jean Alexander.

He was a member of the Seventh Day Adventist church, Elder G. A. Thompson officiated at the services, held in Pegg's Chapel, Beaverton. Interment was in Crescent Grove cemetery.
