

Legal Rule on School Districts OK's Taxing

RECENT RULINGS OF ATTORNEY GENERAL CONCERN MANY GOVERNMENTAL SUBJECTS

For reference by students of government, recent opinions of the Oregon attorney general are given below. A wide range of governmental subjects are referred to;

May 24—In case of joint school districts lying partly in two counties, the rural school board of the county in which the schoolhouse is located is empowered to determine the amount of tax levy to be apportioned to that part of the joint school district lying in the other county.

A joint school district has capacity to maintain a suit or action to enforce a liability prescribed by law in its favor, but a rural school district does not have capacity to maintain such an action since its powers are specifically limited by statute.

May 26—Except in a case of emergency it is unlawful to land aircraft upon the ocean beach of Oregon without first obtaining a

permit from the highway commission, or to land aircraft on any ocean beach contiguous to a municipality and restricted under section 4, chapter 493, Oregon laws 1947.

May 28—State board of accountancy may institute proceedings for revocation of an accountant's certificate upon its own motion under section 44-206, O. C. L. A., or it may require a petition to be filed under promulgated rule No. 17. In either case written notice to the accused must be given.

May 28—Municipal corporations can levy no special or general tax unless the power be plainly and unmistakably conferred. A municipality can not levy a tax upon the curricular activities of a state educational institution unless such power has been conferred upon it.

May 29—Where territory not comprising an entire school district is proposed to be annexed to a union high school, the ques-

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tion of such annexation need only be submitted to the voters in the territory to be annexed.

June 4—A county budget committee, when making estimates of the county budget, has authority to reduce the item of salary in a contract between a county educational board and a county school supervisor when said salary is not fixed by law.

June 4—For the purpose of determining voter's qualifications in school elections on matters other than the election of directors and clerks, "last county assessment," as used in section 111-910, O. C. L. A., refers to the assessment roll after it had been delivered to the tax collector and becomes a "tax roll."

June 7—A district boundary board is empowered to change the boundaries of a regularly organized school district so as to exclude certain areas originally therein contained.

June 8—The notice of an election to be held under the provisions of chapter 529, Oregon Laws 1947, for the purpose of establishing a livestock district, and reference merely to a portion of a precinct is not sufficient.

Under the said chapter the ballot presented to the voters must contain two questions: first, whether or not stock shall be permitted to run at large.

June 16—The state land board is not authorized to sell or lease accretions to tidelands abutting on the Pacific ocean, since chapter 493, Oregon Laws 1947, the shore of the Pacific ocean is declared to be a public highway which shall forever remain as such to the public.

June 16—The state board of health is not authorized by statute

to control or direct the removal of any dead body or human remains after the same has once been interred.

June 17—Corrupt Practice Act is not applicable to persons seeking preferential vote of members of party at primary elections, as aspirants to office of President or Vice-President of the United States. Neither committees nor other persons expending money for or on behalf of such persons are required to file itemized statement of receipts and expenditures with secretary of state.

Flood or Not, PI Exposition Will Go on Schedule

Flood damage to the Pacific International Livestock Exposition's buildings will not interfere with the scheduled opening of the show on October 1, it is announced by Theodore E. Wilcox, president.

The floor of one of the nation's largest show structures was under four feet of water. Aside from depositing a light coating of silt and other residue, the rampaging waters did little damage.

"Doors washed out by pressure of the water will have to be replaced and two new floors will be needed, one for the large dining room and the other for one of the dormitories. Otherwise, repairs will consist mainly of repainting and cleaning," manager Walter Holt, said.

Engineers will check the 11 acre building, making sure that pre-flood conditions are restored.

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led experiences the huge structure has undergone, for, during World War II, it was used by the U. S. army and at one time housed 4500 Japanese-Americans and Japanese aliens.

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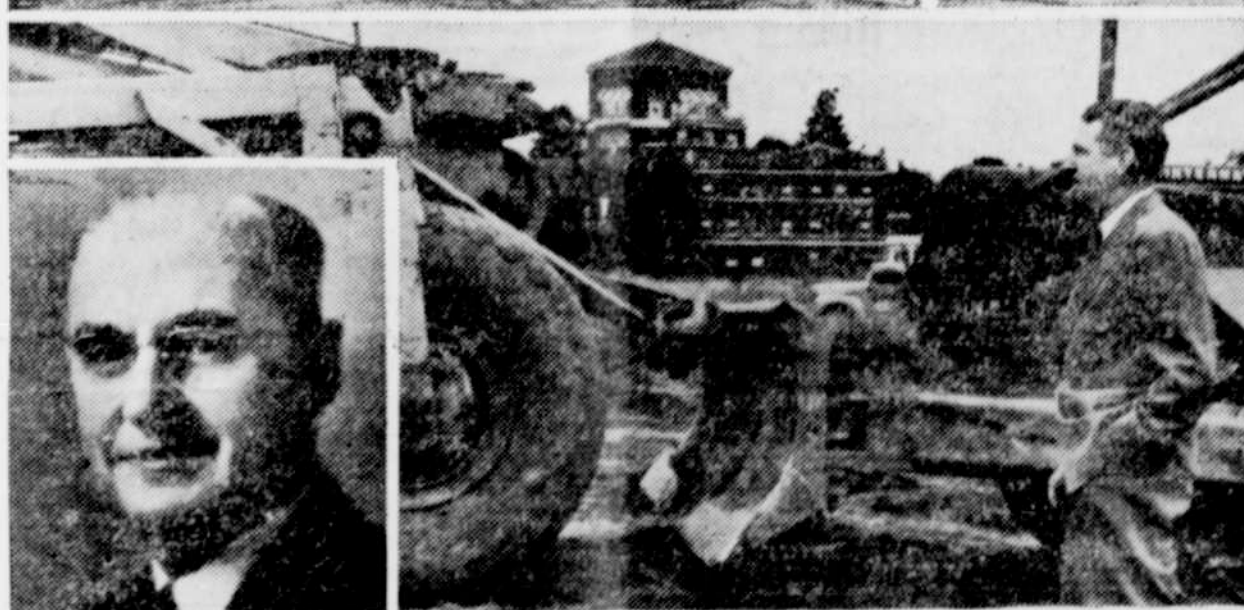
