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Grade School Makes Ready Coming Term

MAINTENANCE AND
IMPROVEMENT FOR
SESSION WINDS UP

Making ready for an enrollment which is expected to show a decided increase over last year's total of 556 pupils, Beaverton Elementary School has just about wound up its regular summer maintenance and improvement program. School will start on September 7.

One of the most critical problems facing the school administration, according to Errol Hassel, superintendent of District 48, is the fact that the new elementary school building will not be ready for occupancy until the middle of the school year. This will necessitate various plans to take care of the assured excess in enrollment.

Some of the improvement projects approved by the Board of School Directors for the present building include installation of a complete sound and inter-communication system and a sound conditioning of the cafeteria with acoustical tile on the ceiling.

At the conclusion of the recreational program, which will be about August 13, the area of the playground, including the play apparatus for younger children, will be covered with an asphalt surfacing.

Architects for the district relate that many calls have come in from contractors for plans and specification, on the new building, for which construction bids will be opened August 13.

Legion Rites Mark Burial Pfc. Frost

ALOHA WAR HERO
KILLED AT LUZON
DURING INVASION

American Legion rites, conducted by Beaverton post 124, will mark the funeral services July 31, at 2 p.m., in the Reedville Presbyterian church, of Pfc. Roland Dale Frost, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jay Frost of Route 1, Aloha, who was killed in action on the island of Luzon, January 8, 1945. Remains, which were sent from the Philippine Islands on the transport Sergeant Morris Crain, will arrive at Pegg's Mortuary, in Beaverton, on July 29.

Pfc. Frost was a member of the national guard and enlisted for war service in September, 1940. Inducted at Fort Lewis as a member of the 41st division, he was later transferred to the 25th division and left for overseas on December 6, 1941.

He saw duty in Hawaii, Guadalcanal, Solomon Island, Marshall Islands, New Georgia and Luzon, in the Philippines, where he was killed the day of landing.

Born in Mason City, Iowa, on February 2nd, 1922, he is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. Jay Frost and the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. Irene Prink of Portland; Mrs. Flora Donnell of Aloha; Mrs. June Bonbrake of Beaverton; William R. Frost of Portland and Leon Frost of Aloha.

Reverend Graham Gilmer, pastor of the Reedville Presbyterian church, will officiate. Burial will be in Crescent Grove cemetery. All friends are invited.

The family has requested no flowers be sent.

Local Woman in England Writes Of Nat'l Hunger

Sending greeting to all from Wolverhampton, England, where she is visiting two brothers and other relatives, Mrs. J. O. Anderson, of Lombard and Front Sts. in Beaverton, writes of widespread national hunger throughout the land.

"To me," she says, "things are simply shocking and getting worse."

Rations, she continues, have been repeatedly cut and as a result one gets what is handed out, not what one asks for. Each person, for one week is allowed six pennyworth of beef, mutton, lamb, horse meat or whale meat, depending on the available supply. Canned or corned beef quota, per week is likewise six pennyworth.

In spite of the depressing atmosphere she encounters, Mrs. Anderson says she is having a wonderful time visiting with her family. She lives mostly on lettuce and tomatoes, as she does not like the bread and would prefer to save her meat rations for those who have to work. Effect of this restricted diet, she says, is that you tire very easily and have no resistance.
