City Manager Report

We started the work on the shoulders of some of the streets we talked about, we laid out from the center pavement to the ditches and peeled off the sod which has grown along the sides of the shoulders, leaving that in a windrow. Right soon now we'll have quite a good deal of that done, we'll hire a tractor with a scoop on the front, and we're going to pick that all up and haul it away. We'll have some spare dirt to dispose of, however, it's not the most desirable for filling in because it has lots of grass in it which doesn't pack so well.

We bought an oil distributor mounted on a truck this week so that the city will have available, equipment for patching oiled and macadam streets and also for laying down new oiled streets. We figure it will pay for itself. Another small piece of equipment has been ordered from Los Angeles—a paint stripping device.

We're quite certain this will pay for itself many times over. We don't have a great deal of painting lines and traffic lanes in the small city of Beaverton but there is enough that the way it has been done in the past with spray gun and templates, two men and a truck and equipment, work almost an entire week to paint all the lanes and signs we do have. We can tell you better after the new line marker arrives and we've tried it out.

We are very sure of one thing, it will be operated by one man and he won't need a truck either and we are rather sure that one man can do all the street marking in about two days time. If so it means that we'll save about fifty to sixty dollars every time we mark the streets, two or three times a year, so that we won't have any trouble paying for that little piece of equipment very rapidly.

You will probably see the legal notices in this issue of the paper, calling for a hearing on the improvement of Erickson Avenue and also of Eleventh Street east of Lombard.

We are told that a group of property owners on the west side of Lombard Street are interested in getting a sidewalk put in as far south as Thirteenth Street at least. We hope this does develop because there is a definite need for sidewalks in that area. There is a little talk of sidewalks out in the Beaverton addition along Fairmont Drive and Sixth St. possibly Third Street also.

That area is greatly in need of some oiling on their gravelled roads too, which brings up the matter of using the new oil distributor for dust oiling. We think this should be handled by the owners agreeing to all pay a share of the cost, deposit the money at the city hall, order the work and we'll agree to put it on the street at the cost of the oil and the labor for the time involved. I can't give you any prices at the present time.

We appreciated the informative article in the Sunday Oregonian, of July 25, giving information about the West Slope area including Beaverton and the fine aerial view, showing the greater part of Beaverton, but we do wish they had used a new photo. From buildings that did not show in the picture, and the state of other developments visible, apparently the picture was taken about fifteen months ago. It would be interesting to see how many more showed up in the foreground in the Beaverton area particularly, at the present time.
