Enlistments For
Regular Army

Following the same pattern shown throughout the nation, Washington county now experiences a steady gain in regular U. S. Army enlistments, according to Master Sergeant Harry L. Mehrens, of the recruiting service, with headquarters in Hillsboro.

Mehrens also announces that applications for gold star lapel buttons, for next of kin of those servicemen who lost their lives in World War II military service are available at the Hillsboro courthouse recruiting center.

The button is a gold star on a purple background, bordered in gold and surrounded by gold laurel leaves. Space for the recipient's initials is on the back.

One button, without cost, will be furnished the widow or widower and to each parent of a member of the armed forces who lost his life in active duty between July 7, 1941 and July 25, 1947.

One lapel button, at cost price will be allowed each child, step-child, brother, sister, half-brother and half-sister of the war dead.

Not only are these combinations satisfying for their distinctive and intriguing flavors, but they reduce the load on the food budget by allowing more of a less expensive fruit or berry to extend a smaller amount of a more expensive one. Simply use the fruits you prefer in any combination you choose with these tested recipes.

Bottled or powdered fruit pectins do the trick. Using pectins the home-maker need not bother at all about the jellifying properties of her fruits. They take the guesswork out of jelly and jam making and prove their economy, too, by producing a greater yield of the same amount of fruit. Your family will be delighted with these sweets:

BLACKBERRY AND CHERRY
JELLY
(Using sour cherries)
4 cups juice
7 cups sugar
1 bottle fruit pectin

To prepare the juice, Crush thoroughly about 1 1/2 quarts fully ripe blackberries. Stem and crush (do not pit) about 2 pounds fully ripe sour cherries. Add 1/4 cup water; bring to a boil and simmer, covered, 10 minutes. Add a few crushed cherry pits during simmering. Place fruits in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 4 cups into a very large saucepan.

To make the jelly, Add sugar to juice in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. At once stir in bottled fruit pectin. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1/2 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim, pour quickly into glasses. Paraffin at once. Makes about 11 six-ounce glasses.

Cherry and Raspberry Jam
(Using Sour Cherries)
3 1/2 cups prepared fruit
4 1/2 cups sugar
1 box powdered fruit pectin

To prepare the fruit, Stem and pit about 1 pound fully ripe sour cherries and chop fine. Crush thoroughly about 1 quart fully ripe red raspberries. Combine fruits and measure 3 1/2 cups into a large saucepan.

To make the jam, Measure sugar and set aside. Place saucepan holding fruit over high heat. Add powdered fruit pectin and stir until mixture comes to a hard boil. At once stir in sugar. Bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim, ladle quickly into glasses. Paraffin at once. Makes about 11 six-ounce glasses.
