PGE Add Huge Transformer At St. Mary's For This Area

INSTALLATION WILL REPLACE TEMPORARY SUBSTATIONS SERVING HOUSING PROJECTS

Under construction since last May and slated for completion in December, a new PGE substation alongside the Bonneville power lines back of St. Mary's will be equipped with one of the largest transformers in the company's system, technically described as a 12,000 KVA capacity unit, according to company statement.

Work started over three months ago, with grading, draining and road-building (to connect with Walker road) occupying two months. Foundation for transformer, battery housing and steel towers is now underway and by the 16th of August, steel and electrical construction work will begin.

Approximate cost for electrical equipment alone will total \$200,000 while total cost of the completed station is estimated at \$365,000.

The station will transform 115,000 volts from Bonneville into 24,000 volts for transmission to other substations. It will also step power down to 12,500 volts, for primary distribution lines and to pole transformers. From this latter supply will come the 110 volt electricity for home use. The station will be equipped with automatic switch gear.

The station will replace several small, temporary substations made necessary by Commonwealth and other housing projects. At the start, two primary distribution circuits are planned. However, further development of the area promises to make necessary the addition of at least two more primary distribution circuits and another huge transformer of the same size as will be installed at the outset.

So large are the transformers, a special railway spur track has been laid, to facilitate its unloading on the concrete foundations.

GROUP PRESIDENT STRESSES VALUE OF ADULT EDUCATION

J. Belmont Mosser, prominent Pennsylvania industrialist recently elected to a one-year term as president of the Kiwanis International, is expected to visit the Beaverton club some time during the coming year, according to Ray Clearwater, president of the local member organization.

Mr. Mosser states that during his term of office he intends to push a program of adult education based primarily on the principle that freedom is "everybody's business" and to awaken the public to some of the dangers threatening their liberty.

Mr. Mosser is vice president and general sales manager of the Speer Carbon company, vice-president of the International Graphic and Electrode corporation (both at St. Marys, Pennsylvania), past chairman of the carbon section of the National Electrical Manufacturers association and has served on the state committee to study education facilities and as co-chairman of six war fund drives and as a director of the St. Mary's chapter of the American Red Cross and Community Chest.

He has served as treasurer for the Kiwanis International for the past two years, with prior service as a member of the international board of trustees, international committee chairman, governor of the Pennsylvania Kiwanis district and president of the St. Mary's club.

Petition Seeks Traffic Control On Cedar Street

Petitions now being circulated in Beaverton will request, from the state highway commission, adequate traffic controls on Canyon road where bisected by Cedar street according to H. S. Comer, in charge of the circulation.

Mr. Comer declares that free access to the highway from Cedar street becomes a major operation for motorists, who some times line up as deep as nine or ten waiting for a break in traffic to allow safe crossing.

But more important, he points out, is the requirement of school children who must cross Canyon road in order to reach their classrooms. The grave threat of serious accidents to school children adds urgency to the petition's appeal, he says.

The safety devices being asked for are signal lights and stop signs, on Canyon road. Citing the stop lights in operation between West Slope and Sylvan, as an example, Mr. Comer finds no lack of justification for the traffic control measures his petition proposes.

Special Election On Issue Seeks Charter Amendment

FINAL LEGAL ACTION SCHEDULED AUGUST 9 AT CITY COUNCIL MEETING; \$225,000 ITEM

Legal voters within the city limits of Beaverton, on August 25, will be called upon to vote on an amendment to the city charter calling for construction and maintenance of a complete sewer system, reports Mayor Paul Knepp, following a council meeting of August 2. Final legal action, to be followed by required advertisement of the election, is set to be taken at a special council meeting, to be held at city hall on August 9.

There is no property qualification in connection with the vote eligibility. Any bona fide voter of the state of Oregon who has resided in the city of Beaverton for 60 days immediately preceding the election is qualified to vote on the sewer issue. This means all residents of the city, since June 26, may cast a ballot. Only one polling place will be operated, in the council chambers of the city hall.

No Word Yet Wash County Draft Set Up

OREGON QUOTA AT 72,800, CONSCRIPT TRAINING FORCES

According to Judge Herman D. Kerkman, status of the draft set-up for Washington county is in a hearsay status, with no official word, yet, on any of the details that will conscript the nation's youth into the military forces. Oregon quota of men, as released from Washington, D. C., lists the requirements of 72,800 men, of whom 72,511 are white and the 289 balance will be negro.

The judge declares that a representative from the state capitol has been looking for selective service quarters in Hillsboro which, it is reported, will process all conscripts from the entire county. This office space is wanted by August 16, in order to have the routine under control by time of first registration, August 28.

Dolph Stuart, county service officer, likewise claims to be in the dark as to draft plans. He relates that several county people have been approached for the job as selective service chairman for the county but he does not know of anyone accepting the post.

It is his understanding, based on hearsay, that the draft will be set up at county seats, at the start, pending actual experience in the registration of youth under the selective service peacetime law.

Drafting of young men will be on a per capita basis, with Multnomah county expected to furnish the bulk of conscripts.

Legal background requirements are practically in shape, except for one minor item which will be ready by next Monday, reports city attorney Paul Patterson.

Extreme care has gone into this work, Patterson indicates, in order to satisfy all legal requirements and to assure the issue its proper reception by bond buyers of the money market.

The amount of the bond issue, for construction and maintenance of a sewer treatment plant, including street mains, is not to exceed \$225,000, which will be subject to general obligation bonds, repayable by an addition of \$125 minimum to city water bills.

Lateral lines, for the collection of sewage, will be financed by cash outlay or Bancroft bonds, applicable to the property which will benefit by the installation.

Delay in connecting with these laterals, by property owners, will result in an added connecting charge, which increases with each year from the time the first connections start.

At the council meeting of last Monday, there were protests on condition of certain streets.

One property owner wanted a report of the improvement of 9th street. City manager Romig, having just received the official engineer's report on this project, declared that the question of ownership on part of the road still clouds the street improvement.

It appears, he said, that the street was never actually dedicated and deeded to the city. Early owners sold property along the present roadway up to a certain street demarcation but failed to make the street official, keeping title to the property themselves. Until this matter of title is settled, the city has no right to proceed with improvement.

Two property owners expressed concern over the condition of 11th street, asking immediate consideration to its improvement. One of the protesting citizens asked if he might buy rock from the city and make possible winter travel into his own driveway, if no other means could be found to correct the hazardous road condition. This, the city advised him, could be done, if necessary.

Turning 7th street into a speedway, for the hazard and jeopardy of little children at play, featured the representations of another citizen. Likewise, the fact that, three years following the graving of 7th, oil had never been applied to hold down the dust and strengthen the road surface, was decried. The citizen was urged to present a petition from property owners so affected, to begin such a long-delayed treatment.

Builder Paulsen, who hopes to put a block of houses on the market this month, asked about water pipes on 8th street, which he wanted installed. He was advised that the work would be completed reasonably soon.

He also cited the line of broken promises in regard to installation by PGE of 11 arc lights, one of which was to be put up in his housing area. The installation has been promised for two years, but the city must await action by PGE before it can be accomplished.

City manager was advised that 160 water users, now inactive, who have some \$384 on the books for deposits not claimed, must be notified before the city can act to take over the amount.

In other action, Friday night relief policeman, Shearer, will receive some increases in his \$1 per hour salary while on duty, subject to the city manager's authorization and Beaverton road, from Short street eastward to the railroad tracks will be abandoned.
