Statewide Total Of Polio Cases Second Highest

With Washington county having reported 2 cases of poliomyelitis and Multnomah county 4, so far this year, the statewide total of twenty-six cases becomes the second highest incidence of the disease on record for Oregon. Other county figures are: Polk, 4; Malheur, 4; Umatilla and Clackamas, 3 each; Clatsop, 2; and Coos, Baker, Jackson and Yamhill, 1 each.

In 1928, 45 cases, mostly from southern Oregon, had been reported by the end of the first six months of the year. In 1947, 9 cases had been listed during the same length of time. The state division of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis warns that with the coming of warm weather during the summer and fall, even a higher incidence is feared.

The following precautionary measures are suggested, for the safeguard of children and adults: Practice cleanliness. Keep flies and other insects away from food. Don't get overtired. Avoid chilling and staying long periods in very cold water. Check with local health departments to avoid swimming in polluted water.

If, in addition to a fever, headache, nausea, a cold, an upset stomach, muscle soreness or stiffness appear as symptoms, call a doctor immediately. Infantile paralysis starts in many ways, much like other childhood diseases.

In case of the disease in the home, get in touch with the local chapter of the NFIP and, above all, remain calm—knowing that the full resources of medical science will be brought to the aid of the ailing patient.

PTA Holds First Health Study, Pre-School Children

The first in a series of Child Health Conferences sponsored by the P. T. A. will be held Tuesday afternoon, August 10, beginning at 1 o'clock p.m. at the Cedar Mill school. Mrs. F. W. Merewether and Mrs. L. S. Uppinghouse make up the committee in charge.

VD Treatment By Penicillin Nixes; Checkup Advised

The Veterans Administration is urging all veterans who were treated for syphilis or other venereal disease with penicillin during war service to undergo periodic check-ups to prevent recurrence of the disease.

Many cases treated with penicillin have proven to be "failures", a VA medical expert gave as the reason for advising the check-ups.

Veterans who suffered from the disease should report to their private physician or local health department. Only those adjudged to have service-connected cases are eligible for care in VA hospitals or clinics. Those with non-service connected cases may obtain care in VA hospitals only when they say they cannot afford to pay for treatment elsewhere.
