Juice From New Source Serves Beaverton Area

Beaverton and surrounding areas in Tualatin valley are receiving their electricity from a new source, as the result of a short circuit, Tuesday afternoon, on the 57,000 volt line from Burlington, on the Columbia river. Trouble was on the transmission lines where they came through the Cornelius pass area, throwing service off for from 3 to 40 minutes.

This line is now out of commission. The outage affected Tualatin valley and part of Portland, stopping streetcars and putting electrical equipment definitely out of operation.

Yamhill Co. Fruit Raiser Enters Race

ACTIVE FARMERS' UNION MAN RUNS ON PROG. TICKET

Entering the race for U. S. congress from the first congressional district, at a convention held at Salem Sunday, August 1, by the Progressive party of Oregon, Theodore Wolcott, Yamhill county fruit farmer and former lieutenant commander of the U. S. navy, accepted nomination as a party candidate. Seventy two delegates participated, representing Benton, Clackamas, Columbia, Marion, Polk, Washington, Lincoln and Yamhill counties.



Wolcott was born and raised in Iowa, graduated from the naval academy, Annapolis, Md., in 1925, and served in the naval service until 1947. As early as 1933, he selected Yamhill county as his home upon retirement from the service and during the last year and a half has engaged in fruit and nut farming.

Active in the Oregon Farmers Union, he strongly advocates a program that will bring the farmers fair prices for their products as well as modern medical and hospital care, regardless of income. In line with the program of the National Farmers Union, he favors a family farm act, which would encourage family farming and limit corporation farming.

Dirt Fills For Canyon Rd. Sites Gives "New Look"

Filling in of dirt at two sites adjacent to Canyon road, in the neighborhood of Short street, has added a new look to the roadside, giving promise of a future development in the business stream of the community.

At present, Henry Mayfield has been piloting a backyard bulldozer, smoothing fresh dirt piled opposite Schuld and Sweetland service station, under the direction of C. S. Fryer, owner of the Quality Pie company of Portland, who also owns the property.

Mr. Fryer reports no definite plans for his newly built up property. The proprietor of the Pappas fruit stand, at the Raleigh Hills intersection, Bertha Beaverton highway, is reportedly interested in putting up a fruit stand, if the Beaverton city building code permits the type of construction he has in mind.

Between Highway Tire Service and Speedy Freeze, a dirt fill has been completed, down to the smoothing off. Plans are said to be in the making for a big project, nature of which has not been released for publication.

Beaverton Banker Takes Second Yr. Seattle Seminar

Jay Gibson, jr., cashier at the First Security bank, Beaverton, is one of 13 bankers from six western states who are attending the sixth session of the Pacific Coast banking school, scheduled from August 2 to 13 at the University of Washington, Seattle. This will be Gibson's second year of the three year course. He is the only banking representative there, from the east end of the Tualatin valley.

First year of the course includes administration of bank funds, loans, legal and current problems. Second year covers earning asset, bank management and investments, and matters pertaining to real estate. Next summer, a third-year class will offer discussions in public and community relations.

The school was founded in 1938 by Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana banker groups to provide officials with an opportunity to discuss problems affecting bank administration and operation. Applicants to the school must be veterans of at least five years' banking experience and must continue their work by extension courses throughout the year.

N. W. Growers To Close Nut Pools '48-'49 Marketing

Filbert and walnut pools of the Northwest Nut Growers for the 1948-49 marketing season will close in a few weeks, announces John E. Trunk, general manager. While the closing date is expected to be about the same as in other years, it is likely to escape the notice of many growers planning to join the pools, because of the lateness of the current crop.

Growth in membership during the year already exceeds the gains of last season, Trunk discloses, and will be greatly augmented by growers joining just before closing of the pools if 1948 follows the pattern of former years.

Trunk attributes the increased membership of Northwest Nut Growers to the widening influence of the organization in the nation's tree nut industry, and to marketing and advertising activities during the past season which resulted in comparatively better returns for members.

Actual date of closing for the pools will be announced in a few days, following a meeting of Northwest Nut Growers board of directors, Trunk said.
