City Manager Reports

The best news we have for this week is the announcement you will no doubt find elsewhere in the Enterprise, that the date for the city election to vote on whether or not we will construct a sewer system, has been set for August 25. The necessary legal announcement of the election date, giving the ballot title and setting time and place will be given next week.

I am asking any individuals or representatives of organizations, who would like to serve on a committee and help supply information about the sewer system, to please see Mayor Knepp or myself this week.

There is one basic thing everyone should understand—the sewer system will cost a lot of money. We don't know exactly how much. The engineer's estimate indicates that it will be between \$350 and \$400,000 but it is essential that Beaverton have it if it is to continue to grow and progress. Every property and home owner should also realize that there are three distinct financing problems involved in constructing this sewer system.

First—the city will issue, not to exceed \$225,000 worth of general obligation bonds. It may be quite a bit less—it will not exceed \$225,000. The purpose of this issue is to construct the sewage disposal plant, purchase the site for the plant, construct main and outfall sewer lines, pumping stations, and trunk sewers.

The second part of the financing will be assessments against property owners to pay for lateral sewer lines in the city streets. These assessments will be made against the front footage of benefited property on the basis of the actual cost. These assessments can be paid in cash, but they may be bonded under the Oregon State Bancroft Bonding Act. This means that the assessments can be paid in twenty equal semi-annual installments. They carry six per cent interest.

The third phase of the financing involves the construction of what we will call house sewer lines. This is a private matter for every individual user. It involves the construction of a sewer line from his house to the lateral sewers, or the main sewers in some cases, in the streets. This cost must be paid by the individual property owners and is not a part of the financing plan to be handled by the city except that we do hope to make an arrangement whereby the city may act as an agent between the property and the sewer contractor and have these lines put in at the time the other work is done in the streets.

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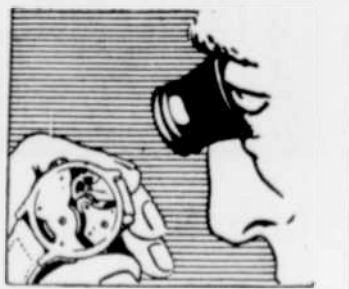
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FROM VANCOUVER

Fed. Govt. Grants
Paralyzed Vets
\$10,000 for Home

Certain paralyzed veterans are now eligible for federal grants up to \$10,000 for the purpose of purchasing or remodeling homes especially designed for wheelchair living, the Veterans Administration has announced.

Eligible under the new law passed by the 80th Congress are veterans of any war or peacetime service since April 21, 1898. They must have a permanent and total service-connected disability due to a spinal cord disease or injury, resulting in paralysis of the legs and a lower part of the body.

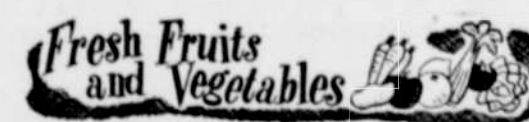
