**STORY OF A CHAMPION**  
"I feel like it was a hard day's work," said LaVelle Flannery, Beaverton swim star, after she reached home last Saturday with the individual point trophy, won in an official A.A.U. swim meet for 1948 Oregon state outdoor swimming and diving championships at Jantzen Beach. In addition to taking high point honors, she also tied for first place in the 200 meter free style race for women, ending in a dead heat with the state champion Sharon Langden.

LaVelle is a 15-year old miss whose exclusive athletic interest today is swimming. She practices every day, in a grueling schedule of training. And each meet she enters, she seems to come a little more to the front.

In Saturday's meet, in addition to the co-championship, she came second in the 100 meters, freestyle, 16 and under; second in 100 meters freestyle, women; third in the 50 meters, freestyle, women and was on the relay team taking first in the girls' class.

**TROPHIES AND MEDALS**  
Still in highschool, at Beaverton, LaVelle has accumulated two attractive trophies and a growing stack of first, second and third-place medals from her swimming competitions.

Perhaps the most imposing, even outshining the recently acquired high point honor, is the trophy in recognition for her winning the one-mile annual Green Lake swim at Seattle. This she accomplished against a field of contestants from all over the Pacific coast, California too (and including) British Columbia.

Putting it in print might indi-

cate that the young swimmer had a magic touch that sort of immobilized her opponents and makes the winning of trophies and medals just a matter of course. But don't you believe that is the case!

Many of her schoolmates will agree that the Beaverton swimmer, puts in plenty of time in a swimming tank. For so many of them have seen her board the bus, day after day, for this purpose.

But she has the determination and the developing skill that, reasonably soon, should bring the luster of fame to the home community as she steps up and up on the ladder of swimming note.

**NIGHT FOR EVERYONE**  
August 14, starting at 8 p.m., there will be an event staged at the Beaverton high school athletic field which should attract everyone young and old.

On that night, for the benefit of its continually growing program for lesser privileged children, the Beaverton Kiwanis club is staging its first annual Bicycle Carnival. Featured will be bike races for boys and girls from 6 to 16 or over plus a thrilling exhibition by the Multnomah County Motorcycle posse, with awards offered to all.

Various committees are shouldering their loads in the setting of plans and arrangements for the event. Youngsters throughout the whole eastern end of the valley meet Friday night, 8 p.m., at Kiwanis Hall, in Beaverton, in the final casting of the various racing events. Spectators as well as contestants stand chances of being rewarded for presence at the affair.

**SPORTS PUBLICATIONS**

**LONG, LONG WALK**

Whether or not Beaverton, Aloha and Tigard will be represented by sponsored contestants in the long, long walk which will take up the days of August 14 and 15, starting at Portland and ending at Banks, will be decided by the outcome of a search for sponsors in each community.

At least three from Beaverton and one from Tigard have indicated interest in the walk-or-run event with \$1750 at the end of the 75 mile rainbow. The sticker in the deal is that each contestant must have a sponsor and none have showed up, yet.

Closing date for qualification in the race is 6 p.m., on Friday. Any last minute decision by a merchant or a group of merchants to sponsor a contestant over the grueling event may do so up until the final minute of the final deadline.

For spectators, the foot-sloggers will pass through Tigard between 7:30 and 8:00 p.m., on August 14; through West Portland between 8:30 and 9:00 p.m. on the same night, according to unofficial estimations. On August 15, the field will pass through West Slope at about 8 a.m.; through Beaverton about 9 a.m. and through Huber, Aloha and Reedville—it's anyone's guess.

Forty five contestants have already signed in. Twenty five are sponsored, at the start of the week. Probably 35 will actually have a go at the \$1,000, \$500 and \$250 prizes for 1-2-3 positions at the end of the event.

Ralph Gruman, probably the most unpopular referee in local circles (squared circles, of course) wound up the mayhem in the early part of the ninth, when Hawkins was reeling drunkenly around before the pumping fistic attack of Petersen. But for his stepping in, Gruman nearly became the victim of Hawkins' fury because the latter hadn't given up his hopes of weathering the storm, somehow, and going the remaining 6 plus rounds scheduled for the evening.

**REMATCH QUESTION**

On August 24, these king-sized sluggers go at it again, in a rematch billed for 15 rounds and the Coast heavy crown. In that rematch, there poses a large question.

That question is whether or not Hawkins, in the interval, will learn that he has such a thing as a right hand. In the last fight, it seemed safe to suppose that he had hurt his right mitt, for seldom—too seldom—he passed up openings in favor of a sharp-shooting left. Given a chance, that right hand might well spell a whale of a difference.
