Local Navy Man Participates In Supply Delivery

Just about headed south to escape the pressure of already threatening ice, Robert W. Bush, seaman apprentice, U. S. Navy, has been taking part in the navy's annual resupply expedition to Point Barrow, Alaska, practically at the top of the world.

Bush is serving aboard the landing ship USS LST 1146, one of the "sea going pack-horses" that shouldered the burden of delivering men, machines and supplies on the beachheads of the world, during the last war.

Five attack cargo ships, two LST's and an ice-breaker make up the expedition whose task it is to deliver 37,000 tons of cargoes to the scattered camps of the naval Petroleum Reserve No. 4, a 35,000 square-mile area lying well above the Arctic circle.

Near Point Barrow which, but for the defense activities, is nothing much more than a small village boasting a whaling station and various trading posts, the Arctic sea is a solid mass of ice for all but a short, uncertain period in mid-summer. Off-shore winds and seasonal movements drive the ice back far enough to allow a hazardous channel along the coast.

Delivery of supplies is a race against time and unloading goes on during the entire 24 hours of Arctic summer sunlight. The expedition, in threading the channel of open water to Barrow, is guided by shore-based reconnaissance planes and the job of discharging its cargo must be accomplished within a week, before the waning summer light fades and the ice moves back on shore for another winter's freezeup.
