NEW BOOKKEEPING SCHEDULE TO GIVE MONTHLY BALANCES

Presented to the City Council in a special meeting held in council chambers August 16, an audit of books by Alfred L. Amacher, CPA, details a story of financial confusion.

City manager M. M. Romig, who had directed a full and complete audit to be made when he assumed office, first part of the year, declares that the accountant will prepare an audit for each of the next six months, to show exactly where the city is going. Furthermore, City Recorder L. J. Busse, has worked out a modification of methods by which he will have an up-to-date, monthly balance sheet at the conclusion of each month's business.

"We have been seriously handicapped," Romig declared, "without a system of bookkeeping that would show the city's financial condition. Forced to operate on the basis of bank balance rather than audit, we have spent money that should have gone to other funds."

Reason for the two year lack of audit is simply that entries were not made in the books. It has cost the city extra expense to get that cleared up and will also cost extra for the monthly audits. But we feel it is safest
