NOTICE OF SPECIAL CITY ELECTION

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN.

That a Special City Election will be held in the City of Beaverton, Oregon, Washington County, on the 25th day of August, 1948, at which election there shall be submitted for the approval or rejection of the legal voters of said city, proposed amendments to the Charter of the City of Beaverton, adopted by the people November 26, 1943, which amendments have been submitted to the voters by Resolution of the City of Beaverton, passed on the 9th day of August, 1948, and filed and recorded on the 9th day of August, 1948, and by which proposed amendments there are 3 new sections proposed to be added to the Charter, which new sections provide for the construction, maintenance, operation and financing of sewers and which will appear on the ballot under the following titles, to-wit:

CHARTER AMENDMENT SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE CITY COUNCIL:

Purpose: To add to the Charter of Beaverton, Oregon, Section 8-A, which provides for the construction, maintenance, extension and operation of sewers, sewer systems, pumping stations, treatment plants by the city, and the acquisition of the necessary lands therefor.

SHALL THE AMENDMENT BE ADOPTED?

Vote "Yes" or "No." 100 Yes 101 No

CHARTER AMENDMENT SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE CITY COUNCIL:

Purpose: To add to the Charter of Beaverton, Oregon, Section 8-B, which provides for the construction of the main trunk sewers, pumping stations and treatment plant, and the construction of storm sewer as a unit or separate units, and authorizes the payment therefor by sewer revenue charges against the water users, regardless of their being connected to the sewer, and authorizes the issuance of not to exceed \$225,000.00 in bonds to pay therefor; said bonds to be financed by said sewer revenue charges and secondly by general taxation.

SHALL THE AMENDMENT BE ADOPTED?

CHARTER AMENDMENT SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE CITY COUNCIL:

Purpose: To add to the Charter of Beaverton, Oregon, Section 8-C, which authorizes the construction of lateral or collection sewers to be connected to the main sewers as a separate project from the main sewer and authorizes the cost thereof to be assessed against the benefitted property and which assessments may be paid by installments and bonds issued against the same.

SHALL THE AMENDMENT BE ADOPTED?

Vote "Yes" or "No." 104 Yes 105 No

Notice is hereby given that there will be one polling place for said special city election, which is to be the Council Chambers of the City Hall on the corner of First and Main Streets in said city, at which all voters in the city will vote, and said polling place will be open from 8:00 o'clock a. m. to 8:00 o'clock p. m. standard time or 9:00 o'clock a. m. to 9:00 o'clock p. m. daylight saving time of said day, except that the polls may, at the discretion of the judges, be closed for one hour between the hours of 12:00 o'clock noon and 2:00 o'clock p. m. daylight saving time of said day.

State Dept. Agri. Approves New Lower Grade Milk

REGULATIONS ON REVISED QUALITY START FROM SEPTEMBER 1 EFFECTIVE DEADLINE

Revised grades and standards of quality for fluid milk and milk products will become effective in Oregon September 1, reports Kenneth E. Carl, assistant chief of the division of foods and dairies, state department of agriculture. Notices were mailed July 30 to all milk plants advising that after September 1 no milk without a grade label may be sold in Oregon.

The new regulations recognize a third milk grade, grade C, which will be a degraded item except that grade C milk may be marketed

when there is not a sufficient supply of grades A and B milk to meet consumer demands, a situation which officials say is again showing up in some sections of the state. All grade C milk sold must conform to standards of sanitation set forth in the revised regulations. These standards are adequate to protect consumer welfare.

In addition to grade, fluid milk and milk products sold in this state must be labeled to show whether they are raw or pasteurized; whether reconstituted or recombined; name and address of producer if raw milk and of plant if pasteurized; and if vitamin D milk, the source of vitamin D and units per quart.

A year's grace period in which to comply with two provisions of the regulations is given. These provisions require a lip protector cap to at least the greatest diameter for all milk sold; and the use of closed vans in hauling milk, except where the farmer does his own hauling. Effective date for these two provisions only is set for September 1, 1949.

Other salient features of the revised standards call for larger floor space for milk houses and a tightening on bacteria count of raw milk for pasteurization—in the case of grade A milk the reduction in count is from 100,000 to 80,000 and for grade B, from 500,000 to 200,000. Milk houses for dairies not on grade the first of September must be 12x14 feet or equivalent to 168 square feet of floor space; the old size was 10x12 feet or equivalent. For the producer-distributor, the milk house requirement goes from 10x20 feet to 12x22 feet or not less than 264 square feet of floor space.

Copies of the complete regulations are now being printed and will be ready for distribution before September 1.

Revisions have also been made in the state standards for milk and cream used for manufacturing, chief change of which is a switch after September 1 to the off-the-bottom method for sediment testing of cream. Heretofore the stirred sample method has been used. In other words, the same method of sediment testing will be used for cream as has been used for milk.

Still a third group of regulations have been revised. These relate to milk products plants and bring sanitary standards of dairy manufacturing plants in line with those relating to fluid milk plants.
