"Something to see, something to do for each member of the family" is a long time boast of Oregon's Great State Fair in Salem. The 1948 exposition to be staged in Salem, September 6 to 12, backs this claim more than ever.

The 167 acres of fairgrounds, one of the finest physical fair plants in the nation, has been geared in every way to accommodate the week long throngs.

Lone Oak track will take over the spotlight each afternoon with the running of the yearly State Fair racing meet. The local half mile track is generally considered the finest fair racing site in the entire West.

There will be thrills plus each night of the fair in the horse show pavilion with the presentation of the championship rodeo-horse show. The combination production will feature the finest show horses of the Pacific Northwest plus outstanding rodeo riders from the major circuits.

Helene Hughes of San Francisco will again present the State Fair musical night show in front of the racing grandstand. This fast moving vaudeville revue will feature top stage attractions from Hollywood, Las Vegas and New York and will be produced as the State Fair Showboat.

George Bruns of Portland with his orchestra will support the Showboat and will also play at the always popular evening dances. Free acts, including the inevitable trained seal, will be presented 3 times daily along the midway.

Late Reports on Market Condition Of Garden Truck

The Portland potato market was firm on August 9, with prices mostly unchanged from a week earlier. No. 1 White Rose potatoes from the Boardman district wholesaled at \$3.00 to \$3.25 a hundred pounds. This was 25 to 50 cents below a year ago. At Chicago, No. 1-A washed Oregon Long Whites sold off the tracks at \$4.25 a hundred on August 9.

Oregon shipped 333 cars of potatoes during the week ending August 7, as compared to 113 a week earlier. Washington loaded 600 cars during the week and Idaho 395. Potato shipments for the entire United States to date this season total 75,292, of which the government has bought 14,723 cars. A year ago at this time 77,272 cars had moved.

At Portland, flats of No. 1 Washington grown tomatoes sold on the wholesale market August 9 at \$1.75 to \$2.00. This was 25 cents under a week before but was 55 to 75 cents higher than a year earlier. Oregon shipped 26 cars of tomatoes the past week. These were the only tomato shipments from the northwest. Harvest of the Milton-Freewater tomato crop

has been slowed by a weak market. Yields are heavy and quality above last year. Heavy blight damage to tomatoes in eastern Washington has greatly reduced the crop and yields are below average.

Eighteen cars of onions were shipped from the northwest last week, compared to 37 the week before. The onion market at Portland strengthened during the past week. Commercial grade Walla Walla yellows wholesaled on Monday at \$2.00 to \$2.25 for 50-lb. sacks. This was around 25 to 50 cents more than on the previous Monday but was about 50 cents lower than a year ago. It appears at this time that onion yields in Oregon will not equal last year's good crop. Mildew is causing poor top growth in western Oregon. Some thin stands and poor top and bulb growth are present factors in the Malheur crop. Idaho's onion crop is expected to be less than last year.

The quality of Oregon's celery has improved but the volume of cutting remains light. Two cars were shipped from this state last week, compared to 3 cars the week before. At Portland, standard crates of Pascal-type wholesaled August 9 at \$3.50 to \$3.75. This was the same as a week earlier but was around \$1.00 under a year ago.

Considerable celery is moving by rail from the San Jose area of California at present. The crop is of excellent quality and is making good yields. The Utah crop is making good growth and harvest is expected to be well under way in about two weeks.
